Wrecking Crew Will Go To Mainland In March

25th Infantry Baseball Team to Meet Leading Aggregations on Pacific Coast—To Battle With College, Semi-Professional and League Teams—Manager Cheney Leaves for Coast on Transport—Have Won 42 of 44 Games This Year

The Wrecking Crew will show them how baseball is played in Hawaii. On the March transport will go the members of the 25th Infantry baseball team to battle with the teams on the Pacific coast. This will be the first invasion of the mainland by a team other than the Travelers, and the strongest organization in Hawaii will meet the best teams in California.

Pacific coast teams have heard much of the prowess of the Wreckers, and have been anxious to see the team in action on the coast. Al Earle of Seaside & Company will arrange a tour that will include games with the fastest semi-professional and college teams in California. Portland and San Lake of the Coast League will be in training, and an opportunity will be given to meet these aggregations.

Undeatable by Visitors.
Up to date no mainland team has defeated the Wrecking Crew, and it will take real stars to do it. They have played together, and the fans have watched their work with interest. One thing that has been noticeable is the manner in which they have gone after every game, and won out. Since the first of the year the Wreckers have won 42 games and lost but two, an average of 95.4 per cent.

The baseball fan would like to look for some time to find a team with a better percentage than this. Five of the victories were taken from the Santa Clara and two from the Olympics. On March 19 the St. Louis team journeyed to Schofield and defeated the Wreckers by a score of 6 to 0 and on May 28 the Chinese team won out by a score of 6 to 1.

Cheney Leaves on Transport.
Manager Cheney of the 25th Infantry will leave on the transport Sherman for San Francisco, where he will remain for two months. During that time he will consult with Al Earle, who will have charge of the bookings of the games on the mainland. Cheney has worked wonders with the team, and is pleased that the boys were given the opportunity to make a trip to the mainland.

The 25th Infantry team has been popular with the fans, and will continue to be. They have played the game on the square. They have won 72 straight games since May 28, and this has proved that the games have been played to the limit throughout. And this is what the fans want.

Drop One?
A certain party who was interested in baseball about three months ago wondered why the 25th Infantry did not throw a game once in a while to make things interesting. "No one can beat them. It would help the game if they dropped one once in a while." This was his statement. Now that statement might have gone all right with some other teams, but not the 25th Infantry.

That plan might have worked for one game, and then Goodnight Baseball in Honolulu. When a team starts this kind of business, then the fans never know where they are at. There are a heap of fans who want to see the wreckers play, and they want to see them defeated, if possible; but you can be sure that the major portion of the fans of Honolulu want to see some team beat them on the square.

Wreckers Popular.
This idea of going out for every game to win has made the Wreckers popular, and the fans can rest assured that they will get their money's worth when the team is seen in action. If the Wreckers had been beaten in the last game there would have been a packed house out to watch the next game, but Roxan wasn't thinking of the stands or the collateral, and as a result he fanned the first nine batters to face him.

When the Wreckers go to the coast in March the fans of Honolulu will be behind them, and the teams in the Golden State will have to put up a fast article of ball to win. It will be a big boost for baseball in Honolulu, and will give the Coasters an opportunity to learn something about the game as it is played in Hawaii.

Enough players will be taken along to stage games through the week, and there is certain to be some hard practice before the series to see who will make the trip. Lieut. Sadtler is going to Angel Island, and he believes that he will have a team ready to meet the 25th squad when they reach the coast.

NINE TEAMS IN FIGHT FOR BIG FOOTBALL TITLE

Pittsburg, Yale, Princeton in East; Michigan, Ohio, Nebraska in Middle West

UNDEFEATED TEAMS

Pittsburg, Yale, Princeton, Oregon, Michigan, Ohio, Vanderbilt, Nebraska, Washington.

Pittsburg appears to have the best chance to claim the championship of the East this year, as Coach Warner's team has beaten the strong teams of the East by big scores. Pennsylvania was routed, 20 to 0, and with a defeat of Syracuse by a good score there is a possibility of claiming the title in the Eastern section. Either Yale or Princeton must lose and Harvard may send one of these teams down the ladder.

In the Middle West Ohio, Michigan and Nebraska will fight for the honors, and should they all go through the season without a defeat there will be a dispute as to which team is champion. Indiana defeated Chicago by a heavy score, and the joke team of the conference held the Tufts squad to a 12 to 10 score, and Tufts beat Harvard. This would indicate that Michigan, Ohio and Nebraska should rank with the Eastern eleven, although Pittsburg looks by far the strongest team on the gridiron this year.

Vanderbilt will claim the championship of the South, and Oregon and Washington played to a scoreless tie. A post-season series would help to decide the question of champion, unless comparative scores can be taken as a criterion. The results of the games on October 28 were as follows:
