SCHOFIELD SHOW PROMISES TO BE BIG PERFORMANCE

SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, Nov. 7.—The preparations for the coming big event at Schofield Barracks point to a series of performances such as the post has never yet had, for Capt. Barney's program is rapidly shaping into very remarkable proportions. While nothing definite has been given out yet concerning it, it is known that it includes some really fine stunts, a thing not to be wondered at as the organizers have the cream of the local talent to pick and choose from. People familiar with the service know what an assortment of clever stunts can be got from amongst so huge a number of men as the big army post contains. Apparently the program is to be extremely varied in character, entirely free of anything like repetition, and will be so ordered that there will be not a moment's delay, the whole show running rapidly through without pause. This is a necessity in consequence of the length of the show. From all accounts the performances have already unusual backing in all quarters, every regiment being keenly interested, while many people here in Honolulu are taking interest; in fact, the question has already been asked whether the show cannot be repeated in the city. Certainly all music lovers will like to hear the big orchestra, for so large a one can ordinarily be heard only in large cities on the mainland.

CHERNIAVSKYS HERE TO PLAY IN 2 CONCERTS

Arriving in Honolulu today, the three great Russian musicians, Leo, Jan and Mischel Cherniavsky, are ready for their concert tomorrow night at the Opera House. Today they greeted many friends made here on their previous visit. Since the Cherniavskys gave concerts here a month ago they have captured the music and art loving public of Canada and have roused audiences in Minneapolis, Seattle, Duluth, Spokane, Portland, Tacoma and San Francisco to a high pitch of enthusiasm. Never in the history of Canada, says one writer, have artists been so much lauded by the press and public. The critic of the Minneapolis Tribune writes that the effect the Cherniavskys produced was at once electrical. The audience cheered and cheered again. They will give another concert on Monday, November 13. A most interesting program is promised for both of these concerts.
