

CITY AFFAIRS AND SUPERVISOR NOTES

The next meeting of the board of supervisors will be held November 14.

A resolution passed its first reading appropriating \$1800 out of the general fund for school purposes to be used to buy equipment and maintain repairs. The price of school desks and other supplies has gone up above the estimate.

At the meeting of the supervisors last evening the mauka side of Kalaheua avenue was opened to traffic and the mauka side closed. The board has also closed King street extension to heavy traffic. This short-cut has been notified to arrest offenders.

The board Tuesday evening approved the request of the Maui County Fair to send Daisy, the elephant, to the fair. Before the vote was taken, however, Larsen suggested that the members wait until today before deciding, as Maui might want a donkey instead.

Police Surgeon R. G. Aver's report of the emergency hospital activities for October was read at the board of supervisors' meeting. It showed that there had been 244 persons treated during the month and 583 treatments. The ambulance made 64 calls. Three outpatients were performed and two patients were committed to the insane asylum.

To protect the city, the county clerk was ordered to sign an easement with the Dowsett Company, Ltd., on a lot known as B-2, in order to allow the city to lay and maintain a six-inch pipe for the purpose of carrying fresh water from the Prison road to a certain road on the reservation. The Dowsett company is about to lease the land to the Union Oil Company.

Supervisor Arnold ordered George Collins, city and county engineer, to notify the bitulithic people that its pavement on Queen street must be repaired as it has broken up before the end of the five-year guarantee. "We have been lenient," said Arnold, "but the street is in a bad condition, and as they are nearly through with King street extension they must fix the street at once."

GUARD OFFICERS MEET WITH COL. R. C. CROXTON

More than 700 men, including the Engineers Company, will attend the big encampment at Red Hill beginning on November 19, according to Col. Richard C. Croxton, who met last night with officers of the infantry to talk over the details of preparation for the gathering.

"I desired to meet all of the officers of the 1st Infantry in a body," said Col. Croxton today. "We had not all got together before to discuss the workings of the guard."

Col. Croxton spoke to the officers on various phases of the work, and presided as chairman at the meeting.

CAPT. M'CANDLESS TO URGE BETTER INTEREST

The officers of Company K, 1st Infantry, National Guard, will take serious steps soon if the attendance at drill by the members of that command does not improve. Lack of interest among the members of this company has been noticeable of late as the attendance at drill has been very poor.

Capt. John McCandless has announced that all members are requested to be present at drill tomorrow night so that an estimation may be obtained as to how many of the men will be able to go into camp next week. Seven men have not signed the new oath yet.

LEAL ACCUSES ADOLPH BODE OF TOSsing HOT CIGARETTE ON HIS TOE

Adolph Bode was tried in police court this morning on a charge of throwing a lighted cigarette on little John Leal's bare toes, maliciously burning the boy. Bode admitted tossing away the glowing coal of tobacco but says it accidently fell upon Leal. Judge Monsarrat administered a reprimand and discharged the defendant.

Leal told the court that Bode, who is considerably larger, continually abused him by slapping and choking him, until his mother appealed to the police because the big fellow refused to obey her orders to leave the boy alone.

Chief McDuffie says Bode is one of a rambling gang that infests Punahou in the vicinity of Wilder avenue. Bode admitted hanging around that district but disclaimed any betting tendencies.

Y. W. C. A. OUTING ON SATURDAY FEATURES CORAL GARDEN TRIP

WOMEN SHOULDN'T SLAP MEN UNLESS NECESSARY SAYS JUDGE MONSARRAT

Slapping a man's face is neither ladylike nor proper, at least under most conditions, according to Judge Monsarrat, who fined Camella Roman \$5 in an offense.

Camella approached her victim in Aala park and inflicted the stinging blow in the presence of a large number of the recipient's friends.

"Sure I slapped his face," she told the judge, "but he deserved it. He wrote some nasty words on my door." Testimony produced by the prosecution showed that the alleged writer could neither read nor write. But Camella insisted he might have employed some one who could.

"It's a bad business to slap a man unless you have to," the judge told her, "because he cannot strike back."
