SALVATION ARMY BEGINS CAMPAIGN TO RAISE \$30,000

Simultaneous with their establishment of headquarters down town at room 7 in the Love building on Fort street, Salvation Army officials, under direction of Brigadier Robert Dublin, started a campaign to obtain funds for the erection of a new building to cost \$30,000.

The Salvation Army has an option for that price on the second building on Beretania street Ewa of Fort, from Frank Huxtable, and the brigadier believes it is a desirable location. He says the army has spent thousands of dollars in rentals here and has long needed a centrally located headquarters building.

Hardly had the campaign begun when one businessman started the ball rolling with \$1000 donation and today the army people are reducing by personal solicitation the amount required.

The new offices in the Love building will be headquarters from now on for every division of the Salvation Army in the territory. Brigadier Dublin is in complete charge of the Hawaiian department and will conduct the various departments, including the girls' home in Manoa valley from the down-town office.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal.—Lieut. Col. Joseph Wheeler, Jr., commanding officer at the Presidio, has been relieved from duty here, the orders not going into effect for several months, however. Col. NO BAR AGAINST KUHIO WORKING FOR HOME RULE

Amendment of Organic Act Section Would Provide for Election of Governor

Delegate Kuhio made a comprehensive study of the situation before announcing that one of the first measures he will introduce in Congress will provide for home rule in Hawaii and the right of the territory to name its own governor, say his friends.

To secure such measures would mean an amendment to section 68 of the Organic Act which provides that the governor be appointed by the president. "But it is a question," a local Republican attorney said today, "whether Congress would want to do this. There is nothing in the constitution about it."

This attorney points out that Congress can do many things as regards Hawaii; it could provide that there be no governor at all, or it could provide for the appointment of the governor in a number of ways. It could even wipe out the Organic Act if it wanted to, he asserts.

It is believed that such a bill by Kuhio also would provide for an amendment of section 68 of the Organic Act in order that the secretary of the territory, as well as the governor, be elected by the people. Another thing it is expected Kuhio will work hard for is the proposed military road on Oahu.

J. C. COHEN OUT FOR MAYORALTY AS REPUBLICAN

J. C. Cohen, president of the Consolidated Amusement Co., announces that he will be a candidate for mayor at the election in June. He will run on the Republican ticket. At the primaries of the last election Cohen received 1100 votes, beating Charles Huxtable and Harry Murray and being second to Mayor John C. Lane. In 1909 he was a member of the house in the legislature and in 1912 ran for the senate on the independent ticket.

So far the only two avowed candidates for the Republican nomination are Mayor Lane and Cohen. Lane has made no official announcement but his intentions are generally known to his political supporters. Rumors of other candidates are afloat but one Republican predicted today that only Lane and Cohen will contest in the Republican primary next April.
