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WOULD DEVOTE REST OF LIFE TO JAPANESE

Retired Methodist Bishop Says He Will End His Work in Japan and Korea

Bishop Merriman C. Harris, the retired bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church in Japan and Korea, who arrived this morning on the Tenyo Maru from San Francisco on his way to Japan, was met on board the steamer by a representative of the Star-Bulletin. When interviewed the bishop said:

"I am going to Japan, my adopted home, to bury my bones there. I am now retired from active service as bishop of Japan and Korea and I am accompanied by my successor, who is taking my place in the Orient. I am now a free man and I can enjoy myself as I please. It is my wish to give the rest of my life to Japan and Korea, and some day I hope to come to these beautiful islands to work among my Japanese people here.

"When I return to Japan I shall make my home for a time in the Aoyama-Gakuin (Aoyama Institute) at Tokio till the home in Kamakura that has been given me is completed.

When asked about the condition of the Japanese on the mainland, the bishop said:

"The condition of the Japanese people on the mainland is greatly improved since my last visit there. The people in the United States are slowly coming to understand the Japanese. I called upon the president four times while I was in Washington, but I had only one opportunity to meet him in his office. President Wilson understands Japan and her people quite well. The relationship between the two nations is becoming closer every year and the mutual understanding between the United States and Japan is becoming clearer. I sincerely hope that peace between the nations will continue forever and we must work toward that object."

Bishop Harris went to Japan in 1873 and remained till 1886 as minister of the Methodist Episcopal church. He is the founder of the Japanese mission of that church in San Francisco and was its superintendent from 1886 to 1904. He also established Japanese missions in Hawaii and on the Pacific Coast and organized them into the Pacific Japanese mission. He was chosen bishop of Japan and Korea in May, 1904. Prior to this Bishop Harris was once an adviser to Prince Ito, the premier of Japan, then governor-general of Korea, and was twice decorated by the late Emperor Mutsuhito of Japan, in 1898 and 1905. The present Emperor Yoshihito promoted him to the rank of second degree for his meritorious services and his work in Japan.

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S. KOZUKI SAYS MAN CONFESSED HE SHOT SEAMAN

Reason Was Paakahili Would Not Pay Him \$50. Former Detective Testifies

"He admitted he did the shooting. He said he did it because the Hawaiian would not pay him the \$50," testified S. Kozuki, former detective, in Circuit Judge Ashford's court today during the trial of Takumi Tateishi, charged with the murder of Oliver Paakahili, who was second mate of the inter-island steamer Maui.

Kozuki testified Tateishi made this statement to him while he was being examined at the emergency hospital on the night of the shooting. "After he told me that I would not let him say any more about it," Kozuki added, in substance.

The former detective, relating the questioning of the defendant, said Tateishi asserted he had been cut with a razor by a Hawaiian and that the razor was back of a bureau in the room on King street where the shooting occurred with the gun. Kozuki said that a search was made and a gun found but no razor. Later, he testified, the defendant said it was not a razor but a knife and that it was in Paakahili's watch pocket. The knife was found in the dead man's pocket, Kozuki added.

"The defendant told me in Japanese that, after the Hawaiian had cut him he had folded the knife and put it in his watch pocket," Kozuki testified, in effect.

Capt. of Detectives A. McDuffie testified that the defendant told him Paakahili had won all the money in the gambling game that is alleged to have been in progress the night of the shooting. He further told the captain, the witness said, that he had asked Paakahili for money which he owed him and that Paakahili got mad and struck him. McDuffie added the defendant told him the dead man owed him \$50.

Further trial of the case will be had at 9 o'clock next Monday morning.
