LETTER THANKS COUNTY BOARD, SAYS KEEP ON

Secretary of Free Kindergarten Praises Supervisors for Work on Playgrounds

Catherine E. B. Cox, secretary of the Free Kindergarten and Children's Aid Association, has written a letter to the mayor and board of supervisors, thanking them for the work done in certain public parks and playgrounds and recommending the repair of other apparatus. The letter, which gives considerable information on the condition of parks and playgrounds in the city is, in part, as follows:

The Free Kindergarten and Children's Aid Association greatly appreciates the provision by the city and county of swings, slides and other suitable playground apparatus and hopes that this policy may be continued and further extended as conditions warrant.

Such apparatus as is already established should be repaired and maintained in such manner as to be safe for children. Unless provision be made for maintenance the apparatus will quickly deteriorate and may become a menace to life or limb. It is reported that in some instances an unsafe condition of some of the apparatus already exists. The superintendent of parks and playgrounds informs us that the appropriation now existing out of which necessary repairs can be made, is not sufficient.

The value of these playgrounds and especially of the supervised playgrounds has been abundantly established. They make not only for health and enjoyment but also for better law and order in the community. At Atkinson park, where the director reports an average attendance of between 60 and 70 children, mostly Hawaiians, boys who were somewhat of a nuisance, if not a menace, to the neighborhood have become the dependable allies and friends of the playground, and have assumed a new attitude toward the community. At Kaimamalu playground mothers in the neighborhood comment on the beneficial effect of supervised work and play.
