COKE'S PAPERS REACH HONOLULU FROM PRESIDENT

Appointment to Judgeship Is
Thought First Since
Reelection

Probably the first commission signed by President Wilson after his reelection, that of Senator James L. Coke as third judge of the circuit court, arrived yesterday from the mainland.

The commission was signed on November 23 and bears the name of Woodrow Wilson under that date. From the time it left Washington it made almost record time in its trip across to Hawaii, arriving here several days before Coke expected it.

"I believe that this may easily be the first commission signed by President Wilson since his reelection," said the new judge this morning. "I hope so, at least, for I would look upon the fact as quite an honor."

"I have been reading the coast papers pretty closely and have not noticed any other appointments since the election. In fact I saw in one paper that the president did not intend to make any until after the senate had convened."

Senator Coke's resignation was to be presented to the public utilities commission, of which he is attorney, this afternoon at the regular session of that body.

It was his intention to resign, effective as of December 15, but the early arrival of the commission led him to change this date to December 10. He hopes to take the oath of office in the supreme court next Saturday morning. A copy of the oath came with the commission from Washington.

NEW CHIEF OF STAFF ASSUMES OFFICE DUTIES

Lieut.-Col. Francis E. Lacey, Jr., general staff, today took office at departmental headquarters as chief of staff, in accordance with the announcement of appointment by the war department made several weeks ago. Col. Lacey has been stationed with the 32nd Infantry at Schofield Barracks.

The following order was also issued relative to his assignment at local headquarters:

"Lieut.-Col. Francis E. Lacey, Jr., general staff, having reported at these headquarters, is assigned to duty and announced as chief of staff of the department with station in this city from date hereof."

Col. Lacey has taken rooms at the Colonial Hotel. His appointment as chief of staff fills a vacancy that has existed for several months in the Hawaiian department.

Mamie Turner, widow, has filed in circuit court a petition asking that the Trent Trust Company be appointed administrator of the estate of the late Sidney C. V. Turner. The estate is valued at about \$94,750. Circuit Judge Whitney will hear the petition Monday, January 8.

GERMAN OFFICIAL REPORT GIVES FULL DETAILS OF CONQUEST OF RUMANIANS

able to make any headway, being mainly repulsed with ease. The increased artillery fire seems to be meant as a cover for the ebbing-down of the infantry attacks.

The Russian pressure is still maintained and is stronger on the Transylvanian east front. In Trotosul valley the enemy succeeded in making some small progress. German and Austrian troops further south succeeded in recapturing a heights position recently lost.

Field Marshal von Mackensen on December 3 brought the battle of Argeful (Argescu) to a decision. The battle has been won.

The operations of the army of Gen. von Falkenhayn, which in the middle of November began with the victorious battle of Targu, and those of the German, Hungarian and Turkish forces which gained on the north bank of the Danube, have been crowned by success. The Danube army fighting under command of Gen. Kosch from Usustov, and the army group under Lieut.-Gen. Kuevenc advancing through western Wallachia beyond Craiova, and the group of Lieut.-Gen. Kraft von Pelmsingen, coming after hard engagements along the Argesul from the mountains, and German-Austrian forces breaking ahead under Lieut.-Gen. von Morgan, by way of Kampolung, have now joined hands.

They are between the Danube and the mountains. The left wing yesterday captured Targoviste. The troops of Gen. von Delmsingen continue their victorious march from Piteshti and defeated completely the first Rumanian army, driving the remainder beyond Titu. They were forced into the arms of the oft-tested 41st infantry division, led by Lieut.-Gen. Schmidt von Koboldorf. On the west bank of the Argeful and northwest and west of Bucharest, fighting continues, successfully for us.

According to an order which has been found the Rumanians intended to defeat separately the Danube army while the Rumanian north wing, first army, resisted. South of Bucharest strong Rumanian and Russian attacks had to be repulsed, and also here a heavy defeat was inflicted on the enemy.

Cavalry flyers succeeded in interrupting the railroad behind the Rumanian army.

The conduct of our troops in various engagements has been beyond praise. They showed a wonderful marching capacity. The rich country conquered and the captured provision carts which were filled facilitated the victualing of the troops.

The Rumanian army has suffered very heavy losses. To the thousands of prisoners taken in the last few days must now be added more than 8000 taken yesterday. The booty seized, war material of all kinds, is incalculable.

The Danube army took 25 cannon, and near Tueta 13 locomotives with much rolling material fell into our hands. The operations continue as planned. New fighting is to be expected.

In Dobrudja there was no important fighting yesterday or today.

On the Macedonian front the loss of a height situated on the east bank of the Czerna, which was taken yesterday by Serbians, and the change of part of our position there, has had no influence upon our troops in Rumania, which are pressing the enemy troops to a decision.

Today on West Front
It was officially reported early today, December 5, that the English advance at Lesars, west front, has failed. Otherwise there is nothing important here.
