

Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, announced last night that negotiations are now under way between the presidents of the four railway brotherhoods and a number of the highest officials of the principal railroads, looking for a settlement of the questions at issue arising from the enactment of the Adamson Law and a solution of the whole controversy outside of the courts. That such a settlement will be arrived at before the end of the year is the expectation of the trainmen.



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
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
