WOMAN'S BOARD TO MEET JAN. 2

The Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands is planning an interesting program for its regular monthly meeting, which will be held on Tuesday, January 2, at 2:30 o'clock in the Bible school rooms of Central Union church.

The program is in charge of Mrs. John P. Erdman and will deal mainly with the Portuguese work. A report will be given by the Bible reader of the Portuguese church, Mrs. Tranquada. The girls of the Aurora Society will sing and the report of that society's activities will be given.

Mrs. Kenneth Barnes will give a general survey of currents and tides in various mission fields of the world, and Mrs. J. H. Williams, who has been for 24 years president of the southern branch of the Woman's Board of the Pacific, will also speak. Special guests will be present, and, it is hoped, will address the meeting. Any ladies interested in missions, local or foreign, are cordially invited to be present.

WATCH NIGHT AT FIRST METHODIST

"Welcome the coming, speed the parting guest," will be the order of the day at the First Methodist church Sunday evening. It will be an old-fashioned watch night service with some modern additions. The pastors of other churches are cooperating in the service as well as the Salvation Army and other organizations, so it will have something of the aspect of a community family gathering to watch out the old and welcome the new year. And as sufficient variety has been provided in the program of the evening, no one need fear that he will be overcome with sleep. There will be "something doing" all the time.

The meetings of the young people of the intermediate and senior leagues will be one hour later than usual, beginning at 7:30. The regular evening service will begin at 8:45, so that those who have attended other churches will have opportunity to attend if they desire. At this service Dr. J. H. Williams will preside the hour will follow, and at 11 the closing devotional services will begin.

The service Sunday morning will be one of especial interest to the local congregation. In 1844 the Methodist Episcopal church divided on the slavery question as did a number of other denominations. During the past two years the general conferences of each branch has voted unanimously in favor of uniting these two Methodist bodies after their separation of over 70 years. The commissioners from the two churches met on Friday, Dec. 28, in Baltimore, to arrange for this reunion. The 35,000 pastors of both bodies have been asked to preach on this Sunday when the commission is in session on "The Spirit of Methodism," and to observe the day especially as one of prayer. These requests will be carried out in the local church. In the recent discussion of church union this is the most important and largest merger yet attempted. The two bodies involved are among

News and Notes From Hawaiian Mission Board

Rev. Norman C. Schenck, superintendent of the Chinese department of the board, is enjoying a few days' vacation. Part of his time will be spent in Koolanoko, this island, and the remainder of the time at home.

The Kawaiahae and Kaunakapili churches will hold a union service in the Kawaiahae church this coming Sunday evening, December 31. Rev. John P. Erdman will preach in English and there will be special music.

Rev. William M. Kawaiwaa was installed as pastor of the Waimea church, South Kohala, Hawaii, on Sunday, Dec. 17. Kawaiwaa has had considerable experience in the ministry, having had pastorates in the Kona and Puna districts.

Rev. Isaac D. Iaea, pastor of the Kuluaha church of Molokai, spent a part of last week in this city. In addition to his work at Kuluaha Iaea ministers to the people of Kumalo, Kaunakapili, Kalae and other parts of the western side of Molokai.

Flaviano Santa Ana of Ewa, Oahu, was recently commissioned as preacher for the Filipinos at Pahaia and Olaia on the island of Hawaii. He left for his new field of work Wednesday morning and will assist Rev. Thomas P. Anderson in his large work on Hawaii.

The Beretania Settlement remembered about 450 children at the Christmas season, among the number being about 50 members of the Waikiki Chinese Sunday school and the Settlement night school. The Christmas holiday season was a glad time for all the young people.

Night schools are being established for the teaching of English to the Filipinos at Pahaia, Puna, Hawaii, and to the Spanish at Hakalau, Hilo, Hawaii. These schools have been started by Rev. T. P. Anderson, missionary of the board among the Spanish and Filipinos in Puna and Hilo.

Rev. Yee Tien Kui, who has returned from a year of study at the Pacific School of Religion at Berkeley, Cal., has made a short trip to his old home in Wailuku, Maui, since he reached the islands. After spending three days on the Valley Island last week he arrived in Honolulu Saturday night.

The attendance at the meeting of the Christian Endeavor Society of the Second Chinese church last Sunday evening was the largest in the history of the institution, there being 137 present. Jay Urie, one of the Y. M. C. A. secretaries, gave an instructive address on the life of Joseph, illustrating it with stereopticon slides.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred O. Wilkins of Los Angeles, Cal., are expected to reach Honolulu in the middle of next month to assume the management of the Kahuwela mission on Vineyard street this city. Mr. Wilkins has had considerable experience along this

the three largest Protestant churches in America. Their combined membership is more than 7,000,000. Their "courtship" and impending "marriage" is being watched with great interest in all religious circles as possibly preparing the way for yet larger union of Christian forces.

On Friday evening, December 22, there was a big Christmas celebration at the Pahaia mission in the Puna district, Hawaii. Rev. T. P. Anderson, in charge of the mission, says that about 250 persons were on hand to enjoy the good things that had been provided. Quantities of pork, beef, poultry, fish, rice, coconut pudding and other delicacies were disposed of and greatly appreciated by the crowd. Speeches were delivered in Hawaiian, Filipino, Japanese, Spanish and English. Among the speakers were Rev. George Laughton and Judge Clem Quinn. Music was provided by two clubs, one of eight Filipinos and the other of three Hawaiian boys. Among the contributors to the success of the affair were W. H. Shipman and Henry J. Lyman.

The more delicate the nature, the more sensitive the soul, and the greater the chance of grief and pain.

The era of Jesus was an era of trouble. To a sensitive heart a journey through the streets of Jerusalem must have torn the soul. Leprosy was everywhere. Poverty was most poignant. The aged were uncared for. These are the unloved by the gods. In them is too little gold to be bothered with. Often they seem to go quickly to the rubbish heap of creation. But the Christ was chosen to suffer. He was educated by pity, was touched by compassion. Home, nature, contact with other races, school literature, languages—these made Jesus a great mind, but taught by pity and compassion at last, the man of sorrows became a great heart—a truth the Savior of the world.
