Letter and cable news received to day from Patterson was highly satisfactory to Mineral Production stockholders. A letter from Manager Gimca gave details of the dioxide plant not had before. He says that the plant will be able to turn out 15 tons in a 24-hour run without the installation of two more retorts, and that such two retorts, costing \$190 each, will increase the daily output to 25 tons, an increase of five tons for each added retort.
