an camp on a lake in the western part of this country. It was entered by Canadians.

Passing Through Locks of Panama Canal—Honolulu Chamber of Commerce.

Passing through the locks of the Panama canal was one of the most pretentious floats, which pictured the big locks used to raise ships over sections of the canal. A model of the steamer Mauna Kea, supplied by the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, added to the picturesqueness of the scene portrayed.

A Bit of Old Mexico—Mutual Telephone Co.

'Old Mexico' was the entry of the Mutual Telephone Company. The float represented a "cabe" home of the more prosperous Mexican homes, with ornate workings and designs in the outer walls.

A Siberian Home—Barnhart Ice Co and Merchants.

A Siberian home in that isolated land of ice and cold was pictured in this clime of semi-tropic sun with a small log house covered with snow and icicles.

Reception of Admiral Perry—the Oleaner Month—Japanese-American Society.

Reception of Admiral Perry represented the historical greeting extended to the great American commodore and envoy in 1854 by Shogun Iyemori above Uraga Bay, near Tokio, Japan. The fore part of the float showed an open-air reception hall such as are common in Japan, with a picture of Uraga Bay for the background. The view evidently being from the hillside far above the waters of the bay.

Buddha of Kamakura—the Month of the Lotus.

The Month of the Chrysanthemum—National Shinto Shrine—Bank of Hawaii.

The National Shinto Shrine in the Month of the Chrysanthemum was a float which showed one of the many little shrines of those who are the religious followers of the emperor of Japan. Shinto priests of Honolulu supplied the party of shrine attendants.

Great Bell of Dai Nippon—The Fall Maple Leaves—Japanese Buddhists.

Water Torii of Myajima and Weeping Willows—Japanese Fisheries Co.

The Water Torii of Myajima and the Weeping Willow were a representation of an actual gateway or torii to a much visited shrine at Myajima, Japan. The gate, similar to those which stand before many shrines in Japan, rises from the shallow waters of the sea at that spot and hence is called the water torii.

Wrestlers and Athletes of Japan—Japanese Y. M. C. A.

There was plenty of action in the float entered by the Japanese Y. M. C. A. depicting the lively and somewhat rough style of the athletes of the Nipponese country.

Thatched House of the Filipino—National Guard.

Story of Malay Rubber, and Daisy, the Elephant—The Waterhouse Co.

In the background was a typical bamboo house, thatched with grass, such as is seen in nearly all of the rubber camps in the Malay district. Clumps of rubber trees, grown in Hawaii, made a pretty and colorful setting. In front of the house, over a fire, natives are slowly turning a mass of crude rubber, giving it a thorough coating of smoke whereby it will be rendered ready for shipment to the factories.

Bamboo Octette of Java—Honolulu Iron Works.

Portuguese Cathedral at Macao—Portuguese Citizens.

A bit of Portuguese history, harking back to the days of colonization, was brought out in the float entered by Portuguese citizens of Honolulu, which was a replica of the old Portuguese cathedral at Macao. Macao is a Portuguese colony which has been in existence since 1557, and is on the south coast of China at the entrance of the West river.

Aboriginal at Home in Australia—Walter F. Frear.

Gold Miner's Shack in Queensland—Sons of Australia.

Jenolan Caves, New South Wales—New South Wales Trade Commission. Jenolan Caves showed the celebrated limestone formations of stalactites which are declared to be the most interesting in the world. The great Jenolan caves are lighted by electricity and visited yearly by thousands of travelers.

Sheep and Wheat Fields of Victoria—Metropolitan Meat Co.

Sheep and Wheat Fields of Victoria was entered by the Metropolitan Meat Company. The float pictured a rustic scene with a stuffed and live sheep grazing calmly in a miniature field of red wheat sent here for the pageant.

Old Toll-Gate House in South Australia—Trent Trust Co.

This was a simple but pretty setting, picturing a typical small Australian farmhouse of stone with red brick chimney. It was at such houses that toll was exacted from travelers along the roads and highways in the early days. The door of the house was shadowed by an arbor on which grape vines were entwined, making an unusually pretty picture.

Apple Orchards of Tasmania—John Waterhouse.

Black Swans of West Australia—Commercial Club.

Black Swans of West Australia was the entry of the Honolulu Commercial Club. The float showed a scene on the Swan river with a dam in the background, before which a number of black swans appeared to be swimming in the water.

A King's House, Fiji—Pacific Club.

A Canoe of the South Seas—Southern Society.

Pan-American Building in Washington, to be reproduced in 1920 Pan-Pacific Exposition, Honolulu—Pan-Pacific Club.

A miniature of the Pan-Pacific building erected in Washington, D. C., as a place of conference between representatives of all the republics of North and South America was exhibited. The building as seen in the float in model form is to be erected in Honolulu in 1920 for the Pan-Pacific Exposition.

A Log House of the Northwest—Northwesterners.

This was something of very modern history. The Oregon building was a perfect model of the structure which was visited by so many thousands at the San Francisco exposition in 1915.

Old Mission of California—Pasadena Hotels.

Gateway Tower of Peking—Chinese United Society.

One of the sections of the great wall of China, built centuries ago to ward off the fierce Tartar tribes from the north, was shown on a float which was of interest because of the care given in detail of construction.

Wisteria Bridge in Tokio—Honolulu Sake Brewery.

Wisteria Bridge in Tokio was entered by the Honolulu Sake Brewery. The float showed a bridge over a painted scene of a river and falls in Tokio, with a framework in the foreground prettily covered with wisteria vine.

Nagoya Castle in Japan—W. R. Castle.

Cathedral of St. Basil, Moscow—F. C. Atherton.

Cathedral of St. Basil (St. Vassili), Moscow, was a miniature and faithful facsimile of this strangest of specimens of architecture. The float showed the chief building of this Greek Catholic church with its 20 gilded and painted domes and towers, all of different shapes and sizes, making a strikingly picturesque effect.

Bacroeboeder of Java—C. M. Cooke.

A Maori House of Pah, New Zealand—Schuman Carriage Co.

The Maori, people dwelling in far-off New Zealand, who, if historians are correct, are closely related to the Hawaiians, were represented in a float showing the unique construction of a Maori house at Pah, N. Z.

A Chief's House in Samoa—George Castle.

Pan-Pacific Building for 1920—Business Men.

The Pan-Pacific Building, as shown in miniature form on the float, is the plan for a building to be erected by the Hawaii businessmen for the 1920 Pan-Pacific exposition in Honolulu.



