Sprinter Will Race Against Automobile at Y. M. C. A. Meet

Can Motor Car Defeat Cinderpath Man Over 75 or 100 Yards? —Added Feature to Y. M. C. A. Meet Should Bring Out Fans —Haynes, Marmon and Excelsior to Make Test—Number of Good Races Scheduled for Big Meet at Alexander Field

Can an automobile beat a sprinter over a distance of 75 or 100 yards? That question has been creating great interest since it was asked in a recent issue of the Star-Bulletin. It will be tried out on Saturday afternoon at Alexander Field at the Y. M. C. A. track meet.

The clubs of the association will hold their track meet at Alexander Field beginning at 1:30, and at this time several of the dealers will make a test with their automobiles to see if they can beat a sprinter for the above distance, from a standing start. Sullivan Motor Car Company believes that they can take the Haynes over a 100 yards faster than Bill Bibbe, Gordon Gibb, Stickey or Bush can run it, while many of the track followers believe that the sprinters will beat the auto out. C. C. Clark of the Able-Hertsche Company is confident that he can beat out the sprinters over 75 yards in a Marmon car from a standing start, and will try it out on Saturday.

Frank Dougherty isn't sure about an automobile winning from the sprinter, but he says that he will back the Excelsior motorcycle to win from any of the cinder path artists over any distance over 50 yards. Other dealers in Honolulu may try it out to give the fans a chance to settle the argument.

The sprinter would certainly have a big lead on the automobile in the start, and it would remain a question of whether or not the motor power could make up the distance in the last few seconds. It is expected that hundreds will journey out to Alexander Field on Saturday to watch the special races.

Many stars will be entered in the meet on Saturday and the 100-yard race should be a fight between Bush, Gibb, Stickey and Auerbach. The same runners with Smith should fight it out in the furlong. With Hawkins, Stickey, Smith and Bush in the 440-yard run, the record for the A. L. N. A. should go.

Meinecke, Decker, Hawkins, Young, Hoon Ki and other stars will be entered in the distance events. The hurdles and relay races should bring out some good performances.
