

WAR FEAR HURTS GREAT NORTHERN

War, or rather rumors of war, took an awful shock at the Hill liner Great Northern's passenger list this morning. When the palatial turbine docked at Pier 14, at 10 o'clock, she brought only 125 first cabin, 24 second and one steerage passenger from San Francisco and Los Angeles, total 150, the smallest list this season to date.

Captain A. Ahman remarked that the only booking list a few days before sailing resembled nothing but page after page of pencil marks over names, many of whom had been booked for six months, but who cancelled at the last minute because of the war scare.

Because of the terrific shrinkage in tourists, the liner brought more from Hilo today than she did from the coast. Her Hilo passengers totaled 168, of whom 24 were first cabin, 21 second and 115 steerage.

How would you feel if you were the only passenger in the steerage of a steamer that has accommodations for 200 first class passengers? It would be rather lonely, wouldn't it?

Russell of Lami Honda, Cal., possessed that distinction on the voyage from the coast to Hilo. He was the only steerage passenger on the Hill liner Great Northern which docked at 9:30 this morning at Pier 14.

The war scare has evidently stopped steerage passengers from booking at San Francisco and Los Angeles because on every voyage heretofore the Great Northern has had from 30 to 50 in the steerage.

Russell's loneliness disappeared when the steamer arrived at Hilo because there 118 third class passengers got on, mostly Spanish and Portuguese laborers, who are on their way to the mainland. He had plenty of company from the Crescent city to the port.

ARMY HUT PAID FOR ON NIAGARA

Right on schedule time, the Canadian-Australian Niagara, Capt. J. T. Rolla, commander, docked at Pier 7 at 8:30 this morning, coming from Sydney, Auckland and Suva.

The big steamer brought a large number of passengers to Honolulu, 85 of whom had only first cabin, 35 second and 19 steerage. Through passengers are 160, of whom 60 are first cabin, 70 second and 20 steerage, not a large lot. The Niagara is leaving for Victoria and Vancouver at 2:30 this afternoon.

Captain Rolla reported a pleasant voyage. He said passengers of the Niagara have in the last year raised money enough to build a Y. M. C. A. hut for Australia and New Zealand troops in the war zone. The structure has been named the "Niagara Hut." Altogether there has been contributed by passengers 400 pounds (\$2000) for war relief and British Red Cross work.

The Niagara has a new purser this voyage, W. J. Omond, who was formerly purser of the Maitai, recently wrecked in New Zealand waters. He was not on board when the Maitai went ashore. The Niagara's regular purser, C. E. Leighton, is taking a vacation in New Zealand.

The Niagara brought 60 tons of freight to Honolulu and has a good stowage through cargo of nearly 2500 tons, consisting of general merchandise of all kinds.

Schofield Notes

SCHOFFIELD BARRACKS, March 29.—Col. Benjamin W. Atkinson, who recently relinquished command of the 2d Infantry and was ordered on duty with the National Guard at Kansas City, has been detailed as division inspector-instructor of the eighth tentative National Guard division. He will proceed to Baltimore, Md., and upon arrival there will report by letter to the Chief of the Militia Bureau at Washington, for duty.

First Lieut. Gustavo J. Gonsler, infantry, inspector-instructor of the National Guard on Kauai, was a visitor at Schofield this week. He was ordered here to take the annual physical examination and on its completion will return to Kauai. He was formerly on duty with the 1st Infantry.

The 2d Infantry, temporarily on duty at Fort Shafter and Pearl Harbor, will be relieved and will return to Schofield about April 6. Six troops of the 4th Cavalry will take up the guard duty at those places, relieving the 2d. With three troops of the 4th Cavalry now in the field at Kuluaku and Port Kamehameha, there will be left but three troops on duty at the cavalry garrison at Castner.

Second Lieut. Charles A. McGarigle, one of the recently appointed officers, who has been undergoing a course of instruction at Schofield Barracks, has been ordered to proceed to Fort Shafter to join the 2d Infantry.

First Lieut. Robert M. Cheney, 4th Cavalry, has been granted a leave of absence for one month, which he will take advantage of upon his arrival in the United States. Lieut. Cheney has finished his tour of duty on Oahu.

First Lieut. Harry M. Kerns, Medical Corps, has been ordered to the Department Headquarters for his examination for promotion to the grade of captain. He is now on duty with the Motor Ambulance Company at this post.

The board of officers appointed to examine Lieut. Kerns consists of Col. Rudolph G. Ebert and Frank R. Keefer and Maj. Charles B. Reynolds, Medical Corps.

Word has been received from the states that Maj. Julius A. Penn, who was on duty at Schofield Barracks for three years as a major of the 1st Infantry, has been appointed to the grade of colonel, his commission being dated from March 2. Col. Penn was promoted lieutenant-colonel in October, 1915, and has since been on duty on the border with the 27th Infantry.

Sgt. 1st Class John G. Dawson, Quartermaster Corps, now at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, has been ordered to Schofield Barracks for duty. He will arrive in Honolulu on the May transport.

Capt. Charles L. Willard, Quartermaster Corps, will complete his tour of duty on Oahu on April 20, and will proceed to the United States on the May transport. He has been assigned to duty at Fort Rosecrans, San Diego, Cal. Capt. Willard was formerly with the 25th Infantry, and has recently been stationed at Schofield Barracks as assistant to the construction quartermaster.

An extension of 14 days' leave of absence has been granted 1st Lieut. Cuthbert P. Stearns, 4th Cavalry. Lieut. Stearns is now in the states en route to join the 4th Cavalry, and has already had one month's leave. He will arrive on the April transport.
