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FRANCE SEEKS INDEPENDENCE FROM GERMANY FOR ITS SUPPLY OF COAL. [By Associated Press] PARIS, France.—However pressing the problem of coal may be to France in wartime, it will be even more pressing with the return of peace. Already the government is studying possible ways and means of freeing France after the war from bondage to German coal. The industrial situation before the war was continually aggravated by the fact that France had to depend on Germany for so large a proportion of her supply of coal. Everybody in France hopes that some way out of a return to that condition of dependency may be found after the war. The situation is complicated by the expectation that Alsace-Lorraine again will become French. The return of these provinces would mean virtually a doubling of the nation's requirements of coal, owing to the immense amounts required for the development of the iron deposits in Lorraine. This means that instead of doing with about 60,000,000 tons of coal a year, as before the war, France will need more than 100,000,000 tons. A French expert, Maurice Alfassa, has just published a report showing where France must obtain her coal if she wishes to maintain independence of Germany. He indicates three main sources. Development of the deposits of coal in France, England and the coal mines on the left bank of the Rhine, the output of which is estimated at 30,000,000 tons yearly. This opens the question of the future of the German territory west of the Rhine, and Mr. M. Alfassa suggests that in the peace treaty the left bank of the Rhine should be given a special economic standing, enabling France to remove some of the tariff walls which existed before the war between herself and Germany. Mr. Alfassa suggests that the peace treaty ending the war should provide for the opening of the Rhine as a free waterway for international trade.

SHEEP RAISING HER AMBITION. Off the stage both actors and actresses have a variety of hobbies. The average actress goes in for strange jewelry, monkeys, cub lions or dogs. It is rare that a successful stage performer of the gentler sex expresses her nonstage nature in such a practical way as the raising of sheep. Such, however, is the strange and matter-of-fact hobby of Miss Cordelia Haager, principal ingenue with the Frawley New York Company now playing at the Bijou theater. Miss Haager, as the saying goes, was "bred in old Kentucky." But early in life she traveled throughout the West before going to New York to take up her stage career. During her first visit to the sheep ranges of Montana, the little actress registered a vow that if possible some day she would own a sheep ranch. She does, and it is said to be one of the most successful sheep ranches in Montana. Practically every dollar she saves goes into improvements on the big tract of land. Year by year the area of the ranch has grown and today it is one of the biggest in the state that used to belong to Senator Clark. "I love sheep," said Miss Haager yesterday, "but my affection for them has taken on a practical turn. I hope some day to retire from the profession and will then take up my work as a sheep raiser in the great state of the West. Wherever I go I study the conditions of sheep-raising and hope that I shall have an opportunity to see some of the large sheep ranches of the territory before the company leaves for the Orient."

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IRELAND'S POOR ARE POORER THAN EVER DURING WAR TIMES. [By Associated Press] DUBLIN, Ireland.—While the Irish farmer is prosperous beyond precedent and wages in many trades are higher than ever before, the condition of the poorer classes in the cities is in many cases worse than for years. "At the present moment the artisans and the poor in Dublin are reduced to a state of privation that causes a great feeling of alarm and dismay," said the Lord Mayor at a meeting of the Corporation this week. Members of the Corporation complained that the work of rebuilding the city, which had been expected to do much to relieve destitution, was not going forward as had been planned. It has been found impossible, he explained, to import the material necessary for the work of rebuilding, although the Ministry of Munitions had promised to facilitate it in every way. A deputation was appointed to wait upon the Chief Secretary and impress him with the great need of employment, especially in the building trades. The appointment of Brig. Gen. Hunter Liggett to be major-general was confirmed by the senate.
