WORK OF GIRLS SEEN IN WINDOW

A remarkable showing of Hawaiian girls' handwork is on display this week in a window of the Patten Company store (formerly A. B. Arleigh & Company). Several pretty articles of the novelty nature of the shopping or the home are in the assortment.

Each article has been woven chiefly from the lan hala (leaf of the hala) and lighter bamboo by students of the Hawaiian Fiber Arts & Crafts school at the old Damon home on Chaplain lane off Fort street between Pauahi and Beretania.

The work is done by a number of Hawaiian girls who are learning the trade with an idea of becoming self-supporting. As many as 19 have been busy in the weaving room at one time, turning out dainty articles of considerable desirability and value.

Money realized from the sale of the articles now in Patten's window will be turned back into the fund to promote the work. The girls are all paid for their efforts.

Anyone wishing to purchase something neat, and clean and cool for a present or a needed article around the home will find a wide assortment in the display. There are fans of various sizes and patterns, cute little trays and boxes, book covers, bags, satchels, waste baskets, writing paper cases, music rolls and table covers. The girls have even gone so far as to create a handsome Shriners' fez with "Aloha" spelled out neatly in a darker material laced into the lighter shades. Then there are pillows and foot-rests, collar boxes, writing desk pads and whatnots.

A visit to Patten's, even though nothing is purchased, would be well worth anyone's time if for no other reason than to see just how capable the young Hawaiian woman is with fingers that work rapidly and well.


DEMOCRATS MAKE CHANGE IN SLATE
