



Kabaulelio Tells Why He's Entitled To Be Next Mayor

David E. Kabaulelio, candidate for mayor on the Labor party ticket, has issued to a large number of voters a circular letter which has attracted much attention and varied comment. Here it is.

"The services which will be rendered to Honolulu as mayor during the coming two terms will be of an exceptionally vital and far-reaching character, calling for a man capable not merely of representing the commercial and social of our community life, but also of a much higher and unique service as well.

"In the next three years Hawaii, at Honolulu, will celebrate two closely related centenary anniversaries which reach down into the soul of its existence. I refer to the time of the completed work of the reign of Kamehameha the first, and to the first coming of the light of the gospel of Jesus Christ to these islands at the hand of God-directed missionaries. Thorough preparation for these events should be the order of the day.

"Both of these anniversaries call for a representative man of the honor of the mayor's chair, a full-blooded son of Hawaii, one both typifying the fruition of the events and who embodies in exceptional measure the spirit of the islands as a whole; around whom can rally cooperatively not only the leaders, but the populace of the territory at large.

"There is much hard preparatory work to be accomplished in connection with the centenary before the time comes, and the mayor's office in the hands of such a man is invaluable aid to the work. Without question the Hawaiians in this flowering of their national life, are entitled to the honor of the mayor's chair, both during the preparations leading up to and in the events themselves, and no one with alpha for Hawaii and its people will seek to deprive them of it.

"In practical conclusion, I would say, that in seeking your suffrage for the office of mayor through the medium of the citizen's party, I shall be free from the hardened incrustations which follow close upon and hamper the work of candidates elected through the older parties, and can at once in cooperation with an earnest circle of public-spirited men and women help to give the city and county of Honolulu a progressive new deal in civic improvements, in moral house-cleaning, and in the intelligent and generous handling of problems vital to the life both of our business community and to that of labor. I earnestly hope that the opportunity presented to rapidly swing Hawaii up into the moral and spiritual vanguard where she belongs will not be overlooked."

EMERGENCY HOSPITAL HAS TWO VERY BUSY DAYS

Minor accidents and petty troubles were rife in Honolulu over Saturday and Sunday as may be seen by the following brief summary:

On Saturday afternoon three Japanese, a wash boy at the Smith street auto stand and two children, went to the emergency hospital with burned hands and feet when gasoline caught fire. Chauffeurs put out the flames with dirt. A little later Solomon Kaha, who was struck by a street car at the corner of King and Bethel streets, came in with a bruised knee. Then Frank Immieul took a trip to the emergency hospital and thence to the Queen's hospital for treatment to burns sustained when the lamp on a bicycle he was riding set fire to some gasoline he had spilled on the street.

The same day V. A. Nahl in car 1949 was struck by a Rapid Transit car on King street near Kekaulike. Shortly after noon Saturday Kodo Machinca who was struck by a baseball bat which a playmate threw up in a tree to dislodge a ball was taken to the Japanese hospital.

Sunday on Nuuanu avenue a car owned by Mrs. McAndrews and driven by S. H. Ware crashed with D. L. Austin's car as the latter was turning into the Austin residence. That morning Herman Panoke, Jr., bruised his arm when a motorcycle with no number swept by him on King street near Kawaiahao church and knocked him down.

In the afternoon a woman who refused to give her name created some excitement with cramps in the water on Waikiki beach. When the ambulance arrived she had fully recovered. Pahaa Iolapua was cut on the arm and went to the emergency hospital when a piece of piping with which he was working on the Lurline fell and struck him. Manuel Oliva also paid the police surgeon a visit after he had been assaulted early this morning on Campbell street near the Fort Ruger road by a gang said to be Spanish.

Sunday afternoon Frank C. Olivera nearly bit his tongue in two when he ran into a swing while running for a ball.
