## DEMOCRATS HOLD FOUR MEETINGS IN LAST EFFORT

Bourbons Steam Up as End Approaches and Rouse Primary Interest

### TONIGHT'S MEETING

The final Democratic primary campaign rally will be held at Aala Park this evening, beginning promptly at 7:30 o'clock.

Speeding up at the eleventh hour with a view to setting before as many voters as possible their views as to how the city and county government should be conducted, the Democratic aspirants to office yesterday held four well attended meetings, one during the day and three last night.

The meeting yesterday was at the Catton-Neill iron works, and last night the orators divided their time between the Mormon church, Punchbowl and Kakaako. Some of the candidates who could not get there before went over to Kakaako last night, leaving there in time to have their say at the town meetings.

The fact that Manuel C. Pacheco, former supervisor, was elected to the senate of the last legislature formed the basis of several of the talks at the Punchbowl meeting. Attorney Joseph Lightfoot, candidate for city attorney, especially praising Pacheco for his work in the legislature, and principally for the part he played in the passage of the Awaoluina bill.

"I am glad to look Senator Pacheco in the face and say 'You are an honest man,'" said Lightfoot. "I'm proud of him and proud that he is a Democrat."

In spite of the fact that it was a Democratic rally, there were shouts from the audience of "Vote for J. C. Lane" and "Vote for Eddie Hopkins," but these remarks failed to dampen the ardor of the speakers.

Lightfoot went on to say that the Democratic party is the one that does the straight thing.

"We don't take your money and spend it like a lot of drunken sailors," he declared.

He asserted that, under the present board of supervisors, 80 cents of every dollar of taxes goes for overhead charges, and then he swung the old campaign club that he has wielded ever since the primary meetings opened, Mayor Lane's expense account of the last two years.

"It has cost you \$23,000 to support the mayor of this city," he shouted. "With that money one cantonier for every three miles of road around this island could have been provided."

Lightfoot did not have a word to say regarding Arthur M. Brown, the present city attorney.

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## CANDIDATES OF G. O. P. PUT OUT STRONG EFFORTS

Crowds Show Inclination to Keep Dominant Party in Office Another Term

### MEETINGS TONIGHT

The Bell theater in Kakaako and Mokapu road, Kalihi, saw two very enthusiastic Republican rallies last night with large audiences and what appeared to be a general movement on the part of the voters in those districts to cast their lot with the G. O. P. party. All the candidates were out and the talks were snappy and to the point to show by figures and fact that all previous Democratic administrations had been opposed to progress while the present Republican administration has shown by all its acts that, even with limited means, its ability has given the people the best government.

Mayor John C. Lane made a stirring appeal to the voters to put back in office a mayor who has dealt fairly with everyone and he also branded as lies the charge that he had been extravagant, giving figures to disprove it.

All the members of the board, Charles N. Arnold, Daniel Logan, Ben Hollinger, William Larsen, Robert Horner and William Ahis, told what the board had done for the people and on this record, which had been attained only after a hard struggle because of the few dollars which were available, asked that they be put back in office.

E. A. Mott-Smith, for supervisor, pointed to his former record as a public officer and gave facts to show he was a friend of the poor man.

J. A. Hansen, candidate for supervisor, said he had had several years' experience as supervisor and promised to give an honest and efficient government if elected. C. H. Bellina spoke on the high cost of living and Edgar Henriques said he was the "good road candidate."

A. M. Brown, city attorney, received big applause by maintaining that newspaper criticism could not make him change his policy which he believed gave the greatest justice to all.

Edward Hopkins pointed out that if the police department had been under a man who could give military efficiency the recent attacks on soldiers and sailors would not have happened as the whole matter would have been attended to in an orderly manner.

Closing Rally Tonight

Aala park this evening will be the scene of a big Republican rally, the last before the primary election tomorrow. All the G. O. P. candidates will be there to make a last appeal and the Hon. Charles F. Chillingworth will preside. Other Republican speakers who will boost for the party will be A. L. Castle, W. O. Smith, E. C. Peters, C. H. Olson, R. W. Aylett, John W. Cathcart and Albert Kauwe. The Hawaiian band and its glee club will see to it that there is plenty of music and the speakers will furnish the fireworks.
