WHAT DEMOCRATIC ORATORS FED KALIHI-KAI AUDIENCE

"The limit!" disgustedly declared a resident of the Kalihi-kai section of Honolulu this morning, describing a Democratic meeting held for that district last night. "I never heard such rot," and thereupon he handed the Star-Bulletin the following notes, as first-hand evidence of what some of the Democrats are using in their campaign.

"Democratic meeting held at Kalihi-kai. Good sized crowd but rain drove many away.

"Most of the speakers took occasion to attack the Republican candidates and both of the papers came in for their share. A two-month-old convert of the Democrats said that the papers wanted to put all the Hawaiians on the island of Lanai so the 'haoles' could have it all to themselves.

"Another said that Hopkins got cold feet when America declared war—and quit the national guard to run for sheriff.

"McLendless explained how the Republicans had spent 80 cents out of every dollar for overhead and only 20 cents on the roads. Where 300 men were employed on the roads (when the Democrats were in) against only 50 today.

"Made a special appeal to the Portuguese voters to support the Hawaiians on the ticket. Warned the Hawaiians not to drink Republican 'dago red' before voting. Stated that some precinct on Vineyard street threw out 71 spoiled ballots—the work of drunken voters.

"Joe Fern (candidate for mayor) attacked the present board for reckless spending of funds—showing little, if any, result. In Portuguese he spoke as follows:

"Republicans no good for nothing. Lie, lie, lie. This time John Lane, mayor, you go fish market, you buy one aku—60 cents. Before, Joe Fern mayor, you can buy for ten cents. One bag flour this time three dollar sixty cents, because John Lane mayor. You vote for Joe Fern for mayor—then you can buy for one dollar thirty cents.

"Republicans no good for nothing—lie, lie, lie!"

"Several Portuguese voters walked away disgusted with the above statements.

"A few other speakers followed, each handing the present board a roast along different lines."

REFUSAL TO MEET IN DEBATE USED BY CAMPAIGNERS

MEETINGS TONIGHT

The Republicans will hold political meetings this evening starting at 7:30 o'clock at the Bell theater, Kakaako, Mokuauia theater, Kalihi, and the Pawaia theater on King street, ewa of Kalakaua avenue.

Taking the stand that William McClellan and Lester Petrie, Democratic candidates, would be a detriment to the working out of a sound business and progressive administration if elected to the board of supervisors and that the only way to obtain this would be by electing the straight Republican ticket, the Republican candidates held a rousing meeting last evening at Aiea, which was unusually well attended. The meeting which was scheduled for Waipahu was called off because of rain. The refusal of the Democrats to meet the Republicans on the same forum for a general discussion of the policies of both parties was also touched upon, the candidates pointing out that the reason the Bourbons had declined the invitation was because they had nothing upon which to argue. Other speakers were Edward Hopkins for sheriff, who promised to establish an efficient police department, and William C. Achi, William Ahi, Charles N. Arnold, Charles H. Bellina, Ben Hollinger, Daniel Logan and E. A. Mott-Smith, supervisor candidates.
