Rosenbaum, 14th Infantry, is detailed for service in the inspector-general's department, to take effect May 16, vice Col. Frederick R. Day, I. G., who is relieved from detail in that department to take effect May 15. Major Rosenbaum, upon expiration of leave, will proceed to Fort Sam Houston and report to the commanding general, Southern Department, for assignment to duty as assistant to the department commander.  
Private 1st Class Alois Napierala has been appointed corporal in the place of Heidebrand, who has been reduced.  
Corporal Kovack, the trombone player at the Airline, is sick in the Department Hospital. His friends hope that he will soon recover, and be at his post as usual.  
The improvements at the Airline are going on apace. The pit for the musicians has been furnished with a rustic rail, and a border of rocks, while two ornamental rustic pillars guard the opening. The ferns have been planted in the two raised beds on each side of the screen, and a two foot border of rocks arranged all around. The whole of the ground space in the enclosure is being rolled

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and covered with tar and gravel, new benches are being placed in as fast as possible and the whole appearance of the popular little theater is greatly improved and beautified.  
Lieut. Hardigg, the regimental librarian, has just received from the mainland some new books on the European war and has placed them on the shelves of the 2nd Infantry Library.  
The recent recruit camp has been broken up, with the exception of about twenty recruits who, on account of a case of mumps among them, have been put in quarantine camp back of the Fort Shafter dispensary. The other recruits have been assigned to the different organizations, and are now being drilled hard and often to get them up to the standard of the companies they are in.

**TROOPS MAY GATHER ALONG BORDER AGAIN**

Intimation that military camps along the Mexican border which stirred with life a few months ago are to be used for concentration camps for the new army is contained in word received in the last mainland mail. Complete details of the mobilization plans of the war department are contained in Bulletin 7.  
About July 15 one-third of the National Guard forces will be drafted into federal service; the second third on August 25, and the remaining third on August 5. The first half million of the draft army will be called about September 1.

**HONOLULU SENDS WORD FROM FRONT IN FRANCE**

German count on America's assistance as of little aid to the Allies, according to a letter received recently by W. R. Castle from Harry Strange, Honolulu man, who has been wounded more than once fighting in France. Strange says that the Germans, although good fighters, are not as

"sporting" as the Allies and surrender very easily now. The prisoners are also less arrogant and seem inclined to apologize for the work of the submarines.  
The rate of the Allies' advance on the west front is in direct ratio to their ability to move the supporting guns, writes Strange, and the war has become a fight for roads.  
In his letter Strange also speaks of more Teutonic brutality and tells of wanton and unnecessary destruction of beautiful French villages.



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
