WASHINGTON SAYS JAPAN NOT SNUBBED

Tokio Criticisms of President's Chinese Note Ascribed to Garbled Versions Given Out There

C., June 14.—Japanese resentment, reported from Tokyo, against President Wilson's cable message to Peking regretting internal dissensions in China and urging support of the republican principles, is ascribed here wholly to the fact that the Japanese have been given garbled versions of the note.

RUSSIA ORGANIZES POLISH FOREIGN LEGION LONDON, Eng., June 14.—Russia has followed the example of France in forming a separate foreign legion to fight with the Allies. The Polish legion which has just been created will rally many Poles to the Russian army.

SEDITION CHARGES AGAINST AMERICAN WITHDRAWN SHANGHAI, China, June 14.—Charges of sedition preferred against Dr. Gilbert Reid, an American, and editor of the Peking Post, were withdrawn today.

FAMOUS BOER GENERAL ASKED TO ENTER BRITISH CABINET LONDON, Eng., June 14.—General Smuts, the famous Boer general, has been invited to join the British cabinet.

GOVERNOR NAMES VETERINARIAN BOARD Governor Pinkham today renamed Dr. William T. Monsarrat, Dr. Harold B. Elliott and Dr. Victor A. Norgaard as members of the examining board for veterinarians.

JAPANESE CABLE REPORTS VICTORY IN SEA-BATTLE OVER THE GERMANS (Special Cable to Nippu Jiji) TOKIO, Japan, June 14.—Following a naval engagement of two hours in the Mediterranean Sea yesterday, the Japanese squadron lost one destroyer, and the Germans are said to have suffered severe losses.

Many lives were lost by the Japanese, on board the Sakaki, which was torpedoed by an enemy submarine. No official report has yet been received at the Japanese war office, and the loss to the enemy is not known.

The Japanese squadron under Rear Admiral K. Sato, which has been cruising in the Mediterranean since April, met a number of German submarines yesterday, and in the engagement the destroyer Sakaki was torpedoed, and began to sink.

The Japanese squadron numbers more than 10 ships, and has been doing effective work in the patrolling of the Mediterranean. Recently the Japanese squadron came to the rescue of two British transports, saving 2800 of the passengers and crews of these vessels.

BOND ISSUE APPROVED BY PRESIDENT WILSON Governor Pinkham today received a cable message from Treasurer C. J. McCarthy stating that the president has approved of the territorial bond issue for this year.

Heavy Bond Exacted of 4 Prisoners

Leader of Alleged Alaskan Labor Recruiters Denied Use of \$2400 in Cash

Bond in the sum of \$2500 was fixed by Circuit Judge Heen today in the cases of G. S. Snyder of Seattle, Wash.; Frank S. Winder, an employe of the Metropolitan meat market; Pablo Manlapit, formerly in the employ of McCabe, Hamilton and Renny, and B. Cruz, a Filipino, who are charged with illegally recruiting Filipino laborers here for Alaskan salmon canneries.

Attorney Breckons announced that on Saturday morning counsel may move to quash the sworn information of the city attorney, or file demurrers to the information. Manlapit was released yesterday on bond in the sum of \$2500, his attorney being surety.

Attorney Breckons declared that bond in the sum of \$2500 was excessive. Brown, referring especially to the case of Snyder, said it was not, as Snyder is a stranger here and has no local property.

The keeping of this money is an attempt to shut this man out of his defense," argued Attorney Breckons. "If the \$2400 is actually the property of Snyder, then he certainly has borrowing power against the money," answered Deputy Attorney Will T. Curden.

The nine Filipinos who are to be used by the prosecution as witnesses have been released on their own recognizance until Saturday morning. They were taken into custody yesterday shortly after the arrest of the four defendants, being held at the police station for investigation.

Manlapit, who was formerly editor of a Filipino newspaper and who was employed by McCabe, Hamilton and Renny during the stevedores' strike, told a representative of the Star-Bulletin today that he was not mixed up in the alleged illegal labor recruiting scheme.

Under the statutes an agent recruiting labor in Hawaii must secure a license, provide a bond of \$25,000 to cover any damage suits, and put up a \$100 bond for every laborer recruited. It is alleged that the four defendants complied with none of these requirements.

Constantine Quits Athens With Queen

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) ATHENS, Greece, June 14.—The Entente troops which have for months been occupying the heights of Piraeus are today marching into the city.

King Constantine, quitting the throne, and Queen Sophia and Crown Prince George, who has been passed by in naming Constantine's successor, are with others of the family embarking on a British warship.

Senator Jonnart of France, who is here to help smooth over internal troubles, explained today that the troops which are being landed from Allies' transports have been brought ashore because life on the close confinement of the ships is unhealthful.

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 14.—News received here from Europe says that the presence of the Allied troops in Athens is possibly to prevent disorders in the capital and to strengthen the new government.

LUGANO, Switzerland, June 14.—The secretary to King Constantine of Greece arrived here today seeking for a villa that might be a suitable residence for royalty.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 14.—President Wilson delivered a notable address today at patriotic flag day ceremonies, in the course of which he again declared the aims and purposes of the United States in the war.

He said the United States is fighting not alone to keep the world safe for democracy but because of the "extraordinary insults and aggressions of the imperial German government, which have left no choice but to take up arms for defense of the rights of a free people and the honor of a sovereign government."

He warned the people against permitting the Germans to end the war by an "intrigue for peace."

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 14.—The Japanese mission to the United States, headed by Viscount K. Ishii, former minister of foreign affairs, is coming to the United States for a full discussion of the problems and results of the revolution in China.

Vice-Admiral Takeshita heads the naval section of the commission and General Sugano the army section. He believed to have come here from Seattle with Snyder, told the court today that he had been here since...

ARTILLERY AND AIRPLANES OF BRITISH IN BELGIUM AID IN SPEEDY AND CHEAP VICTORIES

TREMENDOUS ENTHUSIASM FOR PERSHING MANIFESTED IN FRANCE—POOR PEOPLE SPEND SCANTY EARNINGS FOR FLOWERS

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) LONDON, England, June 14.—Gen. Maurice today made a statement to the Associated Press declaring that the British attack on the German lines along the Messines sector is by far the most successful of the war, in territory won and in the comparative cheapness of the victory.

He said that the record made is due to the superiority of the British artillery and airplanes and proves that with due preparation the enemy can be driven from their trenches.

LONDON, England, June 14.—Naval vessels today brought down a huge German Zeppelin, the L-43, in a battle of sea and air. The naval gunners trained their guns on the great airship flying high overhead. The airship was finally set on fire and fell into the sea. There were no survivors.

Germany can no longer hold her lines on the west against the smashing attacks of the Allies. Whenever the Allies mass men and guns, they make gains, according to the indications told in today's Associated Press summary. The summary says:

"The German line in Belgium is crumbling under the steady British offensive. "The Germans today retreated on a two-mile front south of Warneton, which crosses-sections the first line between the river Lys and St. Yves. "Additional gains are being made by the Allies east of Messines, in the same general territory. "The French front today was uneventful."

Paris Gives Great Welcome to Gen. Pershing and His Party

PARIS, France, June 14.—A tremendous demonstration, at once impressive and pathetic, was given by the people of France's war-drained capital today when Major-General John J. Pershing and his party were entertained on the first full day of their visit to French soil.

"The enthusiasm was continuous and mounting. Great throngs crowded the streets to catch a glimpse of the American general. Cheers rose everywhere and the French and American flags were everywhere entwined. Gen. Pershing visited Napoleon's tomb. At noon he was the guest of honor at a state breakfast given by President Poincare.

"The greatest demonstration is being made by the people since the visit of King George in 1914. The poor people in an exultation of patriotic enthusiasm are spending their scanty earnings to buy flowers to give to or toss upon the American officers and soldiers."

Root Given Welcome By Russians

PETROGRAD, Russia, June 14.—Large delegations of Russians and American residents of the Russian capital today visited Ex-Senator Elihu Root, chairman of the American mission, and the other members of his party.

The Americans are quartered at the Winter Palace. The Provisional Government today granted internal autonomy to Finland. The cabinet has asked a conference with representatives of the other Allies to examine various treaties with the Allied powers.

Berlin Says Air Raiders Safe Home

BERLIN, Germany, June 14.—The German airplanes which yesterday bombarded London have returned safely to their base.

NORWAY SHIPS DIVER VICTIMS NAVY OFFICER IS THOUGHT SUICIDE

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) LONDON, Eng., June 14.—The Norwegian vessels Soerland, Tordenver and Brigid were reported today sunk by submarines.

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 14.—A body believed to be that of Lieut. Raymond Hannon of the U. S. navy was found today. It is thought he committed suicide. He had been assigned to a destroyer bound for British water and disappeared suddenly.
