(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—A bill has been introduced into the House which, if passed, will allow an officer or an enlisted man of the army or navy or marine corps to frank letters through the mail.

DANIELS WANTS WARM CLOTHING FOR SAILORS

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—Secretary Daniels yesterday issued a formal request of congress for an additional appropriation of \$700,000, to be used for the purchase of very warm clothing for bluejackets assigned to duty in northern waters abroad, and also to aid in providing amusements for these men when ashore.

GOETHALS PROMISES BIG TONNAGE OF STEEL SHIPS

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—Gen. Geo. Goethals, general manager of the shipping corporation of the shipping board, announced last night that he expects to build 3,000,000 tons of steel shipping within the next 18 months. This announcement was made at a meeting with a delegation of shipbuilders held here yesterday. The general added that the builders have agreed to furnish the corporation with 8,000,000 tons of material within a month, and that the work will be pressed forward with all possible speed.

SENATE TO CONSIDER DAYLIGHT SAVING BILL

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) WASHINGTON, June 16.—"Daylight saving" legislation, requiring all time clocks to be set ahead one hour during the summer months, is expected to come before the senate in a few weeks with the final recommendation of the commerce committee. Senator Robinson of Arkansas has filed a report for the committee upon the bill of Senator Calder of New York, approving it as "fairly calculated to accomplish valuable economics in our national life."

WILSON AND SENATORS DISCUSS FOOD CONTROL

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—President Wilson is taking every possible means to expedite the passage of the food control measures now pending in congress. Yesterday he summoned to the White House for a conference on this subject, Senator Gore of Oklahoma and Senator Martin of Virginia, together with a number of other senators and representatives to discuss ways and means for getting this bill through the two houses with the least possible delay. The president wishes to "have the measures through congress and with the full effect of law not later than July 1 so that they will be in force when the harvest time comes."



MOLOKAI WIRELESS HAS BEEN REOPENED

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence.) WAILUKU, June 15.—The navy department has decided to reopen the wireless station on Molokai which was closed at the outbreak of the war when the naval authorities took over the operation of all wireless plants. It was the first intention of the navy officials in charge not to make use of the Molokai plant, but this decision has evidently been reconsidered. An operator from the mainland, named Sterrick, arrived on Tuesday last, and the plant has been opened for business since Wednesday.

DEFENSE BOARD PLANS HUGE FLOCK OF AIRSHIPS

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Communication Service) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—Plans for still further increasing the tremendous superiority of the Entente's flying corps over that of the enemy, and giving Allied armies in the field full control of the air have been completed by the aircraft board of the National Defense Council, which has been in session here for weeks.

The first step in the development of this plan, it was said last night, will be the creation of great training bases behind the lines in each of the Allied countries. Here the American aviator will be trained in his work by the flying men of the Entente, who have learned through three years of actual war conditions.

JAPANESE MISSION HAS WEIGHTY POINTS TO DISCUSS WITH AMERICA

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—That the Japanese special mission which will soon visit this country has many very important matters other than those pertaining directly to war problems, was indicated by a statement from the Japanese ambassador, Baron Salto, issued last night.

This statement was issued following a prolonged conference between Baron Salto, Secretary of State Lansing and Counselor for the State Department Schrepe, at which the purposes of the coming mission to this country were discussed at length.

These objects include many complex diplomatic questions pending between the two countries, but particularly those which have arisen owing to the increasing menace of revolution in China.
