

All-Student Team Selected By Fans of Honolulu; Go to Kauai

George Haneberg of St. Louis is Given Highest Vote, With Chun Chew Second—Hundreds of Fans Signify Their Choices—Voting Contest Proves Big Success—Team Practise Last Night for First Time—Nushida, Baldwin, Hayselden to Pitch

Following the returns of the Star-Bulletin contest for the selection of players on the All-Student team was as exciting as the race for mayor in the last election. There wasn't the large vote cast, but for two days the race was exceptionally close, and the stream of letters pouring into the office testified to the interest in the contest.

A large number of students flocked around the office at 11 o'clock yesterday, and when Billy Miles checked over the last vote, which insured a victory for Lam Wing and Kaunane, the students left, some to practise, while others joined in the good wishes.

Haneberg Leads
From the very first vote until the last Haneberg ran well. Some times he was headed by Lal Sin and Chun Chew, but in the last batch of votes nearly every one was marked for Haneberg. At first Sunn Hung ran strong for second base, but the later votes showed that he was given a position in the outfield.

Kaneha made a big gain in the votes of the morning. Previous to this time he was not considered a strong candidate, but in the votes cast yesterday the Punahou pitcher passed Ahn and finished in fourth place.

Teukiyama, who is a pitcher and an infielder, made an excellent showing in the early voting, but You Sun Hoo gradually received a big vote, and in the returns received yesterday morning his vote was 10 to 1 over the McKinley shortstop. Sunn Hung was leading Chun Chew and Iwanaga for a time, and in reality finished fourth in the count, but his vote was split up. The same can be said for Kaneha. Wah Han made a good run for the shortstop position, and richly deserved it, as he is a fast little player.

Billy Miles was all smiles when the vote was counted. The general manager of the St. Louis team said that the fans had made a good pick. Had Miles selected the squad there might have been some question, as he would have been forced to pick Kurisaki, Hayselden, Lal Sin, Haneberg, You Sun and Chun Chew right off the reel.

Teukiyama May Go
Teukiyama was selected by both newspapers as the leading shortstop of the interscholastic league, and the McKinley shortstop did play better ball during the school season than You Sun. The St. Louis star is a really great player, and without doubt would be a more valuable man working alongside of Haneberg, and evidently this was the reason the fans cast their votes for him. Teukiyama is a sweet ball player, and can take his place on the mound if necessary, and will in all probability be given a chance to make the trip if more than 11 men are taken along.

Miles May Send 15
Baldwin is now on Kauai, and this will give Miles a chance to take at least 12 men, and Kauai may allow him to take along 15 players. If 15 are taken Miles will select the 11 winners in the contest and pick out four other players to round out the team. Henry Chillingworth will not go along, and Miles will be gunning for another manager who knows the players.

The contest was the talk of the city yesterday, and was one of the most successful ever held in Honolulu. Sections came from every school in the city, from the army posts and from the baseball players of the city who had watched the school stars in their games.

The players of the various school teams were anxious to make the trip, and all wanted Miles to accompany them, as he had been popular with the boys in every school. Miles will be unable to make the trip, unless he changes his plans.

Team Has Practice
The All-Students held their initial work out at the Motiilli field yesterday afternoon with "Smiling" Billy Miles looking 'em over. The picked stars who turned out were Lal Sin, George Haneberg, Kurisaki, Iwanaga, You Sun Hoo, Ma Ham, Lam Wing and Sunn Hung. The three slabs, Hayselden, Baldwin and Nushida, did not show up. Chun Chew, Miyahara and Teukiyama had to work, so Miles did not have a chance to see them in action. The boys had batting practice at the very start and they are pounding the horsehide harder than ever. Both out and in the field the machine tossers worked like a real machine. Chilly's All-Stars of the Oahu-Service League saw the youngsters in action and they were well pleased to see that the fans of the city had selected such a good team.

Will Use Athletic Park
Inasmuch as the majority of the boys are living near Athletic park, Billy Miles will take his squad to practise at the nearest field until the team sails to invade the Garden Isle next Monday afternoon. Henry Chillingworth, who was to accompany the team to Kauai, has changed his mind.

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and will not go. Pat Gleason may be Miles' choice to manage the team. Pat is a good baseball promoter and will be a valuable man to coach the invaders to victory. The team is working in earnest in order to bring home the three victories and have promised the fans of Honolulu some good news when they return on July 7. On the other hand the Kauai boys are said to be working hard every day in order to win from the students of Oahu. The team may play a game or two before departing for the other island. Tomorrow the boys will practise at 4 o'clock as they did yesterday. Billy Miles expects every member of the team to be present with the exception of "Sleepy" Baldwin, who is already in Kauai visiting his uncle.



NEW RECRUITS MAKE GOOD IN FISHING TRIP

Three good new recruits for the Hawaii Tuna Club were gained Sunday as the result of a fishing trip in Young Brothers' fishing launch Sea Scout, recently purchased from "Jimmy" Jump.

In the party which left Honolulu Saturday afternoon were John Guild, J. A. Balch, J. L. Cockburn, H. Gooding Field, Ernest Podmore and Douglas Guild.

They rolled over the bounding waves until they got to Waianae, where they fished all Saturday afternoon and Sunday, between Waianae and Kaena Point.

Very large strikes were obtained. The fishermen lost four lines, 900 feet of 24-strand line going by the board because of the horse power of the fishes on the hooks.

Although those that got away were about the size of whales, the party caught two kaku, one barracuda and an ulua. John Guild caught one of the kaku and J. L. Cockburn the other. Guild then broke his own record by catching the barracuda and the ulua. The fish were caught from a "sled," using live and artificial bait.

H. Gooding Field says the water was excellent and that they ran into several schools of aku. "There must have been 3000 fishes in one of the schools," he added. "The water was alive with them."
