SAMMIES IN SHAM FIGHT SHOW CLASS

AMERICAN CAMP IN FRANCE.
Aug. 21—The men here are taking part in sham battles with French troops, and are quickly adapting themselves to the new form of warfare now in use in France.
American marines today fought a lively engagement with French chasseurs, who invaded the sea troops' trenches, many of which are named after American rivers and famous sea fighters.
The problems were worked out to afford quick reorganization after attack, and rallying for counters. The plans of the French attacking forces were known in advance, but nevertheless the poilus sprung some surprises.
Thus far the work of the artillery units has been theoretical, but the troops expect before long to have the experience of watching the effect of real artillery fire on enemy trenches.

U. S. SEAMEN COMPLAIN OF DUTCH MENUS

COMPLAINING that they had been treated abominably as third-class passengers on the Goentoe, arriving from the Orient, six American seamen this morning asked to be directed to the shipping inspector's office. They are men who went out to the Orient as sailors on the Dutch liners Randiani and Vendell. One of them is a Hawaiian, James Keatani, who intends to proceed to the coast.
The American sailors declare that they were virtually kept in the hold forward and furnished no tables or chairs from which to eat. "The food was brought into us in a big pot and we had to fish it out with our hands," the spokesman says. The delegation left the steamer and went direct to the inspector's office in the Young hotel this morning.
Because some of the sailors complained of their treatment to the Dutch agent in Hongkong, they were turned over to the police and given two weeks for vacancy in what they term "the worst jail in the world." When others in this party reached Hongkong and started to make similar complaints it was threatened that they would receive treatment like that experienced by the other sailors.
The Goentoe has 94 passengers of all classes who are continuing on to San Francisco. She also brought a Chinese crew for the Solrakarta, which will sail from here to the Orient.

There is one stop-over passenger on the Goentoe, Mrs. R. de Young. Her home is in A. J. K. C. but she boarded the vessel at Yokohama.

'MUCH ADO ABOUT NOTHING' TITLE OF FISTIC CASE

Facing before Judge Irwin in police court this morning, with marks and identification of having been battered up in a fistic fight, J. G. Jardine, J. Bishaw, A. K. Holstein, H. L. Riley and F. Niderost, had their cases nolle prossed at the request of the prosecuting and defending attorneys, W. T. Rawlins and C. H. McBride.
Warrants and cross-warrants for the arrest of each other, were sworn out by the five men, charging each other with assault and battery. They were engaged in a fistic battle on Kalakaua avenue a few nights ago, when Wm. H. Hutton, liquor license inspector, happened along and stopped the fight after he was struck in the face by some one in the crowd.
Hutton this morning swore out a complaint against the five men on a charge of affray. The defendants were discharged for lack of evidence on the part of the prosecution.

Before the trial this morning, McBride, representing Capt. Riley and Niderost, and Rawlins, on behalf of Jardine, Holstein and Bishaw, held a private consultation in Judge Irwin's chamber, and came into court and moved for the nolle prosequi. Judge Irwin granted the request, and the defendants were discharged.
Hutton, who had been hit in the face by one of the defendants, swore out a complaint for the arrest of all the men. The trial proceeded until the court ordered the defendants discharged.

COURT DECISION SENDS HONOLULU OIL TO OVER \$5

A decision from the Ninth Circuit court of appeals in the Caribou Oil case and adverse to the contentions of the government is credited with causing the sharp advance in Honolulu oil stock this morning. The Caribou Oil case is "on all fours" with the Honolulu oil situation. The same points were passed upon that are involved with Honolulu oil and the conclusion unfavorable to the government settles the case as the government cannot appeal.

Other mainland advices state that the United States circuit court of appeals in California has handed down a decision in the Caribou oil case holding that the courts there have no jurisdiction when final certificates are outstanding, and that they cannot appoint receivers. Also, the court of appeals upholds the group development system.

The expectation of the street at the present time is that the cases against Honolulu oil are automatically wiped out and that the issuance of the patents as at one time proposed by Secretary Lane may now proceed.

GARRETT NAMED AS AMBASSADOR TO NETHERLANDS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 21.—John Work Garrett of Baltimore was today nominated by President Wilson as ambassador to the Netherlands.

John Work Garrett began his diplomatic career as secretary to the American legation at The Hague in 1901-3; in 1905-6 was secretary at the American Embassy at Berlin, and was special agent of the department of state to assist the American ambassador at Paris after the opening of hostilities, August, 1914.

8000 VETERANS AT G. A. R. MEET

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 21.—With 8000 veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic in line, the annual encampment was opened here today with a parade in which many were so feeble that they had to ride in automobiles, but many marched bravely along the route, which was crowded with thousands of enthusiastic spectators.

FERN TO NAME WALL FOR CITY ENGINEER JOB

That William A. Wall is to be appointed by Mayor Joseph Fern for the position of city and county engineer, was learned today on good authority.
Mr. Wall is an engineer who has been identified with the Bourdon party for several years and his nomination by the mayor does not come as a surprise now that the board has turned down John Wilson, Mayor Fern's first choice for the place.
Another man who has recently come to the front as a possible candidate for the position is A. S. Cantin, now employed by the Hawaiian Dredging company.
