PARLIAMENTARY NIPPON MISSION WILL VISIT HERE

Another Japanese mission to the United States—a parliamentary one of five representatives of the four political parties in the lower house of the Imperial Japanese Diet—will pass through Honolulu on the Shinyo Maru on September 28.

This will be the first parliamentary mission in the history of Japan officially to visit America. It will undertake an investigation of political, economic and social conditions in the United States.

Mr. Masao was formerly political adviser to the Siamese government. He is a member of the Seiyukai party, as is T. Shimada, another member of the party.

In the last session of the Imperial Diet Mr. Mochizuki attracted the attention of America by his proposal that an exchange of the South Sea Islands, now under Japanese occupation, for the Philippines be made by Japan and the United States.

PROPOSES RAISE FOR SURVEY MEN

Supervisor Chas. N. Arnold, chairman of the road committee, proposed a salary schedule Tuesday for men working on the belt road survey on the windward side of the island. He proposed to increase the salaries of all men under the chief engineer \$25 each, this increase to be an allowance for board. The schedule was referred to the ways and means committee.

What is considered a forward step in the Laimi park improvement plan was taken last night by the board of supervisors in adopting a resolution submitted by Supervisor Arnold.

Deputy Attorney A. M. Cristy told the dubious members of the board that the purpose of the resolution was to advance the project as far as possible with the points on which residents of the district were agreed. The resolution tentatively granted the contract to John Duggan, low bidder, pending the results of the public hearing. Cristy pointed out that objections such as James T. Taylor, a resident, has raised could be discussed at a public hearing. Taylor is willing that Duggan have the contract. The resolution also directs the city engineer to draw up revised plans for the project.

With a big lump still appearing conspicuously on his left eye, Chas. Maile, a Hawaiian seaman on board the inter-island flagship Manna Kea, this morning appeared before Judge Irwin and pleaded guilty of drunkenness. The court sentenced him to pay a fine of \$5 and costs of court.

RUSS AGENT TO ARRANGE RETURN OF LOCAL SLAVS

Advices received here by Dr. Augustus Marques, vice consul for Russia, are to the effect that a special representative of the Russian government will arrive in Honolulu on a foreign steamer on September 14 to make arrangements to send back to their native country all Russians in Hawaii who desire to go.

Consul Marques has, for some time past, been working on plans to return the Russians to their homeland, but, owing to chaotic conditions, no definite action has been taken until now, and the Russian government is sending a special delegate here to complete the arrangements.

Men, women and children alike will be considered in the plan. It is reported that a number of young Russian men will take advantage of the government's offer of passage, as they are anxious to join the army. Consul Marques explained today that none of the Russian men here have been called back to the colors.

About a year ago 67 Russian families were sent back to Russia through the local consulate.
