

# BOURBON ACTION TAKES PEACEFUL ASPECT IN COURT

### Attorneys Whisper and Hearing on Injunction Goes Over to September 22

Although "fireworks" were anticipated, the dove of peace fluttered about in Circuit Judge Ashford's court this morning when Attorney J. H. Lightfoot and Deputy City Attorney A. M. Cristy met to agree on a stipulation in the injunction suit brought by L. L. McCandless against the supervisors and other municipal officers to hold up the pay of Park Superintendent A. K. Vierra.

An order summoning the city officials into court to show cause why a temporary injunction should not issue was to be argued this morning, but Mr. Cristy whispered in Mr. Lightfoot's ear, and Attorney L. L. Burr talked, and everybody smiled—and the whole business went over until September 22. Attorney Burr is assisting Attorney Lightfoot, who represents Mr. McCandless.

Attorney Cristy raised the point that, as the city and county had not been served, it was therefore not a party to the case; that is, not yet. Attorney Cristy, however, said he was appearing specially for the municipality. Attorney Lightfoot remarked that the city would be served immediately.

"Why serve the city and county when you have served all the officials individually?" questioned Judge Ashford.

In reply to this Attorney Burr said plaintiff has reasons for wanting to make the county a party as well as the individual officers.

Hearings and other procedure went over until September 22, at which time the answer or other pleadings of the respondents will be heard.

# NO CONFIDENCE HELD IN SPECIAL WAGE COMMITTEE

### Japanese Leaders to Adopt New Tactics in Seeking Pay Increase

Reorganization of the plan to be followed with a view to procuring higher wages for the Japanese laborers on plantations, was decided yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the Japanese newspaper leaders.

At the same meeting, lack of confidence in the special committee named at the first conference, or at least lack of confidence in some of them, was expressed in a resolution which was read and adopted. The resolution said that some of the members of the special committee were not in favor of serving on the committee on account of their business relations with the local merchants.

At 7 o'clock next Friday evening the second conference will be held in the Japanese Central Institute on Nuunau street.

Dr. I. Katsuki, a member of the special committee, yesterday sailed in the Siberia Maru for Japan. He and his family will remain away from the territory for many months.

Y. Takakawa, president of the Japanese Merchants' Association, it is reported, will also leave for Japan this month. He is going on business and will not return here until the latter part of this year. Takakawa is a member of the special committee.

Rev. G. Motokawa, who presided at the first conference, was among the passengers who departed yesterday for Japan.

# QUEEN LILIUOKALANI GIVES \$100 MONTHLY TO RED CROSS

### Her Majesty Touched By Appeal for Mercy Funds and Out of Sympathy for the Cause of Liberty and Humanity Offers Voluntary Contribution

Liliuokalani, queen of Hawaii, has donated to the Red Cross a gift of \$100 monthly as her tribute to aid in the alleviation of war's sufferers.

Announcement to this effect was made today by Gov. Pinkham, following word from Washington that President Wilson had announced the gift to the world. The governor, who was so impressed with this act in Hawaii, queen and who realized the influence such a gift would bring from the hand of the gracious queen, officially notified the president. The governor issued the following statement today:

The territory of Hawaii is under the control of the department of the interior. This great department is called upon to furnish over 1000 men, from its employees, for service at the front and feels its duty to specially look after them and has established a division of the Red Cross to undertake this work.

A month since an appeal was sent to the governor of Hawaii to secure funds.

Her Majesty, Liliuokalani, was apprised of the facts and made the contribution her letter indicates. Additional money was added by the honorable secretary of Hawaii, Col. C. P. Iaukea, and a friend.

This contribution of the ex-queen was no notable and unparalleled and could have such an influence on the whole country, the governor felt it should be announced by Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, which he has done this day.

Gov. Pinkham also made public the following letter from Queen Liliuokalani, which gives expression to her sympathy with the work of the national Red Cross, as follows:

In response to the call for aid and relief and as an expression of my sympathy with the work of the national Red Cross in the cause of liberty and humanity, it affords me pleasure in handing you for transmission to the proper authorities in Washington, the enclosed donation to the War Relief fund, with the announcement that the contribution will be renewed monthly to the close of the year.

# ATKINSON PARK SUMMER SCHOOL VOTED SUCCESS

The Free Kindergarten and Children's Aid Association met yesterday to hear reports on the work of the summer and to plan the work of the kindergartens for the coming year. That a shortage of funds might hinder the work in the future was brought out in the meeting.

"Notwithstanding the very generous contributions of the Castle family, the Castle Home funds are low," stated Mrs. I. M. Cox, "and the association would call the attention of those interested in the welfare of the children of Honolulu to the needs of the home. Any contributions may be sent to Mrs. Mist on Upper Manoa road."

The association extended a vote of thanks to the board of supervisors for the \$150 contributed each month to the payment of the salaries of the directors.

That the summer play school carried on at Atkinson park under the direction of Mrs. Margaret Waldron was successful enough to warrant its continuation in the future was the feeling of the association. Mrs. F. L. Waldron's report showed a total attendance of 445 during July with an average attendance of 175 and a total attendance of 440 in August, and an average attendance of 160.

The summer kindergarten carried on by the Free Kindergarten Training school alumni at Kauluwela kindergarten through July was reported a great success. It furnished a gathering place for the family groups of the most neglected children. Mrs. Cox stated, besides providing the children profitable means of spending their time. A feature of the kindergarten was a lunch which was prepared at the kindergarten, but paid for by the children who attended.

# STIFF PENALTIES FOR COUPLE WHO STOLE AND LIED

### Sentence of Seven and Five Years Passed Out to Young Hawaiians

Tried and convicted of second degree burglary, indicted for perjury and given prison sentences in both cases, was the experience of David Kelau and John Blossom, Hawaiians, who stood before two circuit judges this morning and heard spoken the words that placed them in the custody of High Sheriff William P. Jarrett.

Kelau and Blossom were recently convicted of second degree burglary. They entered several houses and stole articles of value, one of the homes ransacked being that of Arthur G. Smith, deputy attorney general. This morning Judge Ashford sentenced Kelau to serve not less than three and one-half years at hard labor in Oahu prison, and Blossom not less than two years.

Yesterday afternoon the two men were indicted on a charge of having committed perjury in the burglary case. After Judge Ashford had passed sentence, they went into Judge Heen's court where they pleaded guilty to the perjury charge. Kelau was given three and one-half years and Blossom three years.

As the sentences imposed in the different courts do not run concurrently, Kelau will serve seven years and Blossom five years in Oahu prison.

# CAPTAIN LUDY IS HEARD IN BERG INQUEST

With what is believed will be the last hearing on the death of Miss Florence Berg, former Queen's hospital nurse, set for Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the police investigation to find persons criminally responsible for the woman's death is reaching what appears to be an unsuccessful conclusion.

Capt. John B. Ludy, physician of the department hospital at Fort Shafter, was the most important witness to appear in the fourth hearing in the police station yesterday afternoon. Mrs. William Moe testified first and was followed by another former Queen's hospital nurse, Miss Zoe Osborne.

W. R. McAllep reiterated the story of the ride taken by himself, Miss Pohlman, Captain Ludy and Miss Berg on the Saturday before the woman was taken sick. Miss Pohlman told the story of the ride again. (Capt. H. M. Kearns, a physician of the department hospital, and a close friend of Captain Ludy told of what he knew of the case, adding nothing new.

Asserting again his innocence of any responsibility for the woman's condition or death, Captain Ludy related the tale of his relation with the girl. Captain Ludy said he met Miss Berg in December when he was introduced to her by Dr. West, an intern at the Queen's hospital. In telling of his relations with her, he said that he considered her a good girl, grew very fond of her, often took her out, and his relations were such that he had never any reasons to be ashamed of them.

"I am not the father of the child nor am I responsible for the abortion," Captain Ludy stated.

Captain Ludy said that he had never proposed marriage. Coroner Asch stated that he had a letter in his possession, written by Miss Berg to her father, which referred to possible marriage with Captain Ludy.

Captain Ludy stated that he had never accompanied Miss Berg on board the German gunboat Geier. Asked by Coroner Asch whether they called one another by any nicknames, the army doctor answered that he called her "grandma" and she called him "grandpa."
