
KORNILOFF JAILED AS SLAVS STEM HUN DRIVE

MYRTLES WIN FROM HILOTIES

Myrtles, In Great Flash Of Speed, Show Heels To Big Islanders Hilo Overcomes Lead And Outdistances Healanis In Final Spurt

3 TOWNS RETAKEN BY SLAVS

With Duke P. Kahanamoku at Stroke, Myrtles Get Off to Splendid Start and Steadily Forge Ahead But Hilo Cuts Down Lead on Final Spurt; Hui Nalus Take Canoe Race

LATE NEWS

NORTHWEST SHIPBUILDING IS TIED UP BY STRIKE PORTLAND, Ore, Sept. 15.—Trade unionists in the lumber trade are out on strike for the principle of the closed shop and higher pay. All workers in the shipyards where wooden ships are built at Portland, Astoria, Vancouver and St. Helens are idle, and estimates by labor officials show that 2000 men are laid off.

SWEDISH CHARGES BACKED

U. S. Department Claims it Has Von Eckhardt's Letter to Prove Swedish Agent Acted as Germany's Messenger

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 15.—State department officials today are emphatic in their position that the charges against von Eckhardt, German minister to Mexico City, are in every case proved, and declare that it was only after considerable investigation that the authenticity of the messages was reached.

WITH Duke P. Kahanamoku stroking, the Myrtle Boat Club crew won the senior six-oared barge race from the Hilo Yacht Club by a whole boat length in the second race of the 21st annual Regatta Day celebration which is being held in the harbor today. Healanis followed another boat length in the rear of Hilo. The time of the race was 14 minutes, 52 3-5 seconds.

U-Boats Again Reported Near Atlantic Ports

ATLANTIC PORT, Sept. 15.—That German sea tigers are again close to the Atlantic seaboard of the United States seeking innocent merchantmen as their prey, is the conclusion reached if the report of a British captain, whose vessel made an American port today, is to be relied on. The Britisher reports that on Wednesday he picked up on "S. O. S."

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 14.—By proclamation of President Wilson today the entire sugar industry of the United States is placed under food administration control through the license system which provides for full control of the manufacture, distribution and importation of both the raw and refined product. The federal system provides licenses for all sugar importers, refiners, beet producers, brokers, jobbers and all distributors of sugar.

HAVANA, Cuba, Sept. 14.—Representatives of the Cuban sugar industry met today and named a committee of three to proceed to Washington and confer with Food Controller Hoover regarding the program for the fixing of the price of Cuban sugar.

FRANCE, Sept. 14.—One hundred dollars is the price placed by the Germans on the first American soldier taken dead or alive. Knowledge that the bitter enemy felt by the Teuton towards the Americans had inspired the Germans to put a premium on the first American soldier taken prisoner or laid low by a German bullet, as incentive to the Hun troops to fight against the United States troops was revealed through German prisoners captured today.

Directed by W. R. Farrington, president of the Ad Club, the Maui and Kauai delegates, the Honolulu welcoming delegation and the lone delegate from Hilo fell into double-file marching order and the parade to the promotion committee rooms started.

JAPANESE BOY DROWNED An unidentified Japanese boy, aged about 6, fell off Pier 5 this morning and was drowned. The lad was fishing off the pier, when he lost his balance and tumbled into the water. Several Hawaiian boys, who had gathered about the pier to dive for coins, jumped in after the lad but failed to rescue him before he sank for the third time. Attempts to revive him failed, and the ambulance was called. He had been dead some time when the Emergency hospital attendants tried to resuscitate him.

SENATE PASSES WAR CREDITS OF \$11,538,000,000 WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 15.—The war credits bill, aggregating \$11,538,000,000, was today passed by the senate without a single dissenting vote. It is claimed this is the largest measure of the kind in the world's history.

MEXICO CITY, Mexico, Sept. 15.—In an interview today, German Consul von Eckhardt emphatically denied he had ever sent a communication to Berlin through Swedish Consul Cronholm or that he had recommended that official for decoration for services rendered to Germany.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Sept. 15.—Foreign Minister Lindman, in a statement today, said that Sweden realized the seriousness of the situation.

Russ Inflict Severe Defeat on Germans Near Riga; Republic Again Emerges Safely From Crisis as New Cabinet is Formed

PETROGRAD, Russia, Sept. 14.—Gen. Alexieff, commander of the southwest armies, today telegraphed Premier Kerensky that "Korniloff, Lokomsky, Romanovsky, Colonel Pleustchevsky and Pliushken have been arrested. Members of the commission of inquiry are due to arrive at Mohilev at midnight. The arrested persons are to be turned over to their hands. The troops at Mohilev are true to Kerensky."

PETROGRAD, Russia, Sept. 15.—Petrograd today spent the most quiet and complacent day in more than a week with the conjoint announcement that General Korniloff and General Lokomsky had been arrested and that the Russian army, with its morale in part restored, had resumed the offensive again against the Germans and inflicted a severe defeat on them on the road to Pskoff. Three towns were occupied, Kronberg, Keitzen and Sisseral.

Petrograd today is most concerned in the ultimate fate of Korniloff. What penalty will be meted out to the disloyal army head by Premier Kerensky, who has promised no mercy to those who seek to overthrow the government, is exciting wide discussion. After an all night discussion by Russia's political leaders, it was announced that the republic had again passed safely through the rough seas of the recent crisis. A new cabinet has been formed.

At the session of the Petrograd council of deputies Thursday night, the Balsh-Viks, the ultra radical party, gained its first great victory and it was an almost overwhelming one. It scored great gains and the vote was 278 to 169 in favor of the position that has been adopted by these extreme radicals. By this vote council adopted a program or platform which calls for, among other radical demands, not only that there shall be established a social democracy, but that all representatives of property shall be excluded from power.

In addition to the demand for the immediate declaration of a democratic republic, abolition of all private property rights, that the working classes shall have full and entire control over all productive industries, confiscation to the uses of the government of all profits gained through and by reason of the war, "merciless taxation" and that all taxation shall be borne by capital and not by the masses.

PARIS, France, Sept. 14.—The French after a severe battle today report the election of the Germans from the greater part of their trenches in the Gaurieres wood.
