### ASK JAPANESE TO GIVE HELP TO RED CROSS WORK

Consul-General Rokuro Moroi Issues Proclamation Urging Nipponese to Support Big "Drive" That Begins Next Saturday Morning

THE PROCLAMATION.

The American Red Cross, being placed under the heavy strain of the war, is spreading its organization throughout the United States. The service rendered by the American Red Cross for the wounded, and in relief work, are being carried out to a most remarkable degree.

The Honolulu Chapter of the American Red Cross has completed plans to launch out a membership campaign on Saturday, September 29, its goal being set for 5000.

We, as an organized agent for the Red Cross Society of Japan, have been requested by George R. Carter, former territorial governor, to participate in this great movement.

Although the local branch of the Red Cross Society of Japan has a membership of almost 8000, we feel, even then, that the share that we have in the great cause is very insignificant.

Being under the protection of the Stars and Stripes, we feel that we should willingly show our hearty cooperation in unselfish assistance in this campaign.

Japanese Consul General Rokuro Moroi, head of the local Japanese Red Cross Society, in his official capacity through the Japanese newspapers, urging that all the subjects of the Emperor of Japan residing in Hawaii, show their patriotic spirit by supporting the Red Cross campaign which is being waged in the territory.

T. Murakami, secretary of the Japanese Y. M. C. A., with headquarters on Smith street, this morning stated that he expects to see the Japanese take part in this work on Saturday, September 29.

Consul General Moroi has appointed the following as special members of the Japanese Red Cross Society to participate in the campaign which the American Red Cross Society is carrying on:

### ISHII WORKING TO HAVE STEEL BAN REMOVED

(Special Cable to Nippon Jiji) WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 25.—Negotiations for a repeal of the steel embargo law were reported today by Viscount Ishii, head of the Japanese war commission, conferred with Secretary of State Lansing and renewed the discussion of the question of removing the prohibition of putting a ban on the exportation of steel and iron from the United States.

From a reliable source it was learned today that the United States government is firmly insistent that Japan should send her ships to sea change for lifting the American steel embargo, not only to the Pacific, but to the Atlantic as well, and in carrying American soldiers and supplies to France. Meanwhile Viscount Ishii takes the stand that the Pacific alone should be looked after by Japan, and that the Atlantic should not.

Viscount Ishii today sent a lengthy cablegram to the foreign office in Tokio, which is believed to have something to do with the steel embargo, and the pending negotiations. He is eagerly waiting for the report from the home government.

That Viscount Ishii and his party will pass through Honolulu tomorrow, during the latter part of October is the information contained in a personal letter received a few days ago by M. Nishigaya of Honolulu, who is an intimate friend of the distinguished Japanese diplomat.

According to the letter, the Ishii party will sail from San Francisco on the T. K. K. liner Shinyo Maru, due to leave the Bay City October 13. This will bring the commission here October 19. Reservation for cabins for the party aboard the big Japanese liner has already been made at the T. K. K. branch office in San Francisco.

T. Imai, vice-consul at the local Japanese consulate, who was ordered to the mainland to join the commission, will leave the party at San Francisco and take an American steamer to Honolulu.

### ENEMY TRADING ACT IS PASSED

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Wireless.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 25.—The house today speedily passed the trading with the enemy bill and the measure was sent to the president for his signature.

Once put into operation it is expected that all German-owned financial institutions will be taken over by the government acting as custodian, or will be conducted under government supervision.

Other drastic provisions aimed to prevent communications from reaching the enemy are included in the bill which establishes censorship of the mails and domestic telegraph companies.

### LIQUID FIRE ATTACK BEATEN BACK BY FRENCH

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Wireless.) PARIS, France, Sept. 25.—North of Verdun the Crown Prince is vainly endeavoring to regain some of the positions Gen. Petain's men captured in the late offensive. Launching a strong offensive, in which liquid fire was used against the French positions, the Germans failed to make good their objective, and were repulsed all along the line with heavy losses.

### HUN TRAVELER ASKS REPRISALS

(Associated Press by U. S. Naval Wireless.) AMSTERDAM, Holland, Sept. 25.—Reprisals for the ill-treatment of German prisoners captured by Belgians in the South African campaign is advocated in an article by the German explorer, Carl Peters, in a recent issue of the Hamburger Nachrichten.

Commenting on the indignities and hardships forced on his countrymen by the victorious Belgians, the Hun traveler advocates that "double the number of Belgian men, women and children, of a station socially superior to those who have been tortured, should be compelled to march ten times, in the dead of winter, between Constanza and Riga, inadequately clad, and fed only on the commonest prison fare."

### OBJECT TO REOPENING OF MATHESON SUIT

Deputy City Attorney A. M. Cristy has been served with a copy of objections to the granting of a motion allowing the city attorney's office to file an amended information charging R. O. Matheson, editor of the Advertiser, with criminal libel. The objections contend that the amended complaint states no crime and that an attempt by innuendo to extend the meaning of words is not libel per se. The motion for leave to file the amended complaint will be heard tomorrow afternoon.
