Over 3000 Persons See Wreckers Win

Contest at Schofield Viewed By Tremendous Crowd Yesterday

(Special Star-Bulletin Correspondence) SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, Oct. 7.—By far the largest crowd that ever attended a baseball game at this post, the attendance being estimated at 3000 paid admissions, saw the Twenty-fifth Infantry and Coast Defense nines play the third of a series of three games and the Wreckers win by the score of 4 to 0. The hero of the fray was one George Washington Waterhouse.

Waterhouse held the heavy hitting Coast Defense aggregation hitless and runless for seven innings and just 21 batters opposed him.

In the eighth Davis spoiled Waterhouse's near record by smiting the pill to left center for a three bagger. Roach also reached first in the last cant when Smith bobbled on his tap to short but the runner was speedily doubled up when Johnson hit to Gollah for a double play via Smith and Hawkins.

Waterhouse Wonderful

Waterhouse's performance on the slab was remarkable, when it is considered that but five balls went by the infield, including the one hit. The crowd pulled for Waterhouse to pitch the nine innings without a batter reaching first. He was assisted by his comrades, who, with the exception of Smith, played errorless ball, accepting several chances of the near-impossible variety, Gollah, Hawkins, Smith and Fagin especially contributing scintillating plays.

Johnson met with an accident during the week, nearly severing one of the fingers of his throwing hand, and consequently was out of the game today and probably will be for a protracted spell. However, Williams performed in his place creditably.

Kelly and Crumpler, who both performed on the hill for the Coast Defense nine, also pitched classy ball as is evidenced by the fact that the Wreckers garnered but five hits.

Coast Defense On
In the eighth frame Davis slammed out a triple to left center after two were down and died when McClain tapped for an out Gollah to Hawkins. With one down in the ninth Smith errored on Roach's tap to short, Johnson soused a hot one to Gollah, who tossed to Smith forcing Roach, Smith relaying the ball to Hawkins in time to nab the runner.

In the first frame for the Wreckers Hawkins walked, Smith sacrificed him to second, Rogan singled to center, Hawkins scoring, Rogan reaching third on the throw in an attempt to catch Hawkins at the plate, Gollah out for bumping the third strike, Johnson out Kelly to Bailey.

Another run was registered by the Wreckers in the third, Rogan safe on Womack's error, Moore also safe when Davis erred, Rogan advancing to second and in trying to make third Bailey threw to Womack who tagged Rogan for an out, Moore scampering to second in the meantime, Gollah lifted a short fly to center, Johnson hoisted a high one to Cummings for what looked like an easy out but Cummings dropped the pill, Moore registering, Fagin made the third out Johnson to Bailey.

It looked as if the Twenty-fifth were to make a killing in the fifth inning when Crafton, first up, tripled to center, Waterhouse fanned, Hawkins safe on Bailey's error, Crafton counting, Hawkins doubled on Smith's tap to short, Rogan walked, but Moore flied out to Kelly.



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PUNAHOU TEAM IS OUT-PLAYED IN FIRST GAME

Neither Squad Scores in Contest Featured By Mediocre Playing of Both Elevens

By fumbling the ball on the first down when they were within about 10 yards of their opponents' goal following the completion of 20 yard forward pass, the College of Hawaii lost its one opportunity to score on Punahou academy in the first game of the interscholastic series, played on Alexander field, on Saturday afternoon. Neither team scored.

Although there were several long runs, much hard line bucking, and many attempts at forward passes, the game was poorly played throughout. Punahou was not over confident as her early season prospects might have led her to be, but the showing that the team made was somewhat disappointing. Kauhane broke away for several long runs around right end and Peterson's kicking was good.

Fassoth Good
Fassoth played conspicuously on defense for Punahou at left end, but Baldwin next to him at left tackle, allowed Kong to pass through him for several long gains. Alexander and Akana on the other side of the line played well.

The college team played harder than Punahou, but had little team work. Around Brash, Ballentyne, Bromley, Kong, Mariuchi and Hayselden the eleven was built.

Brash made several long gains, but did not show up as well as usual. Kong at right half was the real shining light of the college back field although Bromley was a tower of strength in all departments.

Except in the first quarter when the long pass to Mariuchi from Brash took Hawaii to within the shadows of the Buff and Blue goal, the ball remained almost constantly within the two thirty yard lines. Punahou being on the defensive and Hawaii on the offensive.

The goal was kicked and the score stood 7 to 0 in favor of Kamehameha to the end of the game.

Thompson opened up the forward passing of his team with one to his right end early in the first quarter, putting the ball well into Kam's territory. The ball was then in the Kalibi boys' territory most of the first quarter, after the touch-down by Clark.

The second quarter was featured by the line bucks of Groves. Kam started to get through the McKinley line around the tackles, and Fuller distinguished himself by downing the man with the ball before he had started. Heminger pulled off a tackle back end run that netted McKinley about 15 yards. Thompson made a couple of yards on a fake kick, but Kam took the ball on the last down of the quarter.


Third Quarter

Chicago Sox Win Another Game From New York Giants

Contest Sunday Goes in Favor of Chicago Team By Big Majority of 7 to 2—Chisox Knock Three Pitchers Out of Box, Scoring Profusely

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 8.—Batting three Giant pitchers out of the box the Chicago White Sox won the second straight game in the world's series here yesterday from the New York club by a score of seven runs to two. It was the lucky fourth inning again which gave Chicago the victory and a crowd of 32,000 fans a chance to throw their hats, canes and score cards away in celebration.

Up to the fourth frame both clubs played an even game and even after the balloon ascension the Giants steadied down to baseball but in that one inning the pale hose aggregation simply ran away with the battle collecting six hits and five runs.

Both teams broke even in the second inning. The Giants heartened their supporters by scoring two runs Robertson crossing on McCarthy's single and Holke following when Jackson threw wild to the plate. That closed the scoring sheet for the losers.

In their half of the second the Sox evened the score and packed the bases before their session was over; Jackson and Felsch scoring on singles by Gandil and Weaver.

The fourth was the finish frame so far as the Gotham men were concerned. Anderson, who had replaced Schupp in the box for the Giants, lasted until two runs had been scored. Then he was derailed in favor of Pol Perritt. The inning opened with Weaver up. Buck singled and Schalk followed his example. Faber fouled out and then Liebold cracked a safety that counted when Weaver crossed the rubber. McMullen pulled the same stunt and it was then that Perritt was not sufficiently warmed up with the result that the White Sox machine kept up its work. Eddie Collins and Jackson touching him for safeties that brought in three more runs.

The Giants used four pitchers in the fray. Tesreau taking Perritt's place in the eighth, and not one of them could hold the rushing Sox. Urban Faber for the Chisox went through the game without a great deal of difficulty. During the last seven innings it was a case of one-two-three, only three men facing Faber in each inning. Reckless baserunning and failure to hit safely with men on the bags cost the Giants the double plays.

With Schupp, Anderson, Perritt and Tesreau out of the way McGraw has only Benton and Demaree left in his bag. Benton is a good enough pitcher and open to surprise, but Demaree is more or less a back number. Rowland has Reb Russell, Danforth, Williams and Benz. Of these four Russell is the only likely looking article to match Benton.

The two teams left here today for New York where the third game of the world's series will be staged tomorrow. Old Roman Comiskey was confident that his men would cop the series while McGraw refused to talk baseball other than to say that the series were not over yet.
