HOTEL IS SUED BY NAVY MEN

Two Sailors and Girl Alleging Ejection From the Young Dance Floor Seek \$5000 Damages; Declare Employes Discriminated Against Uncle Sam's Uniform
U. S. LAW IT IS CLAIMED HOTEL AGENTS VIOLATED
Uniforms of the United States, punishment, for discriminations by theater, etc., against wearers of that hereafter no proprietor, manager, or employe of a theater or other public place of entertainment in the District of Columbia, or in any territory, the district of Alaska, or insular possessions of the United States, shall make, or cause to be made, any discrimination against a person lawfully wearing the uniform of the army, navy, revenue cutter service or marine corps of the United States because of that uniform, and any person making, or causing to be made, such discrimination shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500.

UNITED ATTACK SUCCESS

Haiq's Men Drive Huns Back Through Poelcapelle While French are Rushing Teutons on the Belgian Front
BRITISH FRONT in France, Oct. 9.—After a terrific hurricane fire General Haiq's forces again hurled themselves against the crown prince's army east of Ypres this morning, attacking on a wide front, the attack being timed simultaneously with a forward movement of the French south of Houtholst forest on the Belgian front. Both attacks were successful.

GRAND JURY ASKS FOR PROSECUTOR TO AID IN PROBE

An appeal, it is understood, has been made by the territorial grand jury, now in session investigating among other things the circumstances surrounding the death of Miss Florence Berg, Queen's hospital nurse, and vice conditions, to Attorney General Stainback, for a special prosecutor to aid in ferreting out the desired information which will serve as an aid in accomplishing certain objects.

DROUGHT LOSSES ON MAUI TO RUN TO 80 PER CENT

Drought conditions in the Makawao and Haiku districts of Maui will result in losses as high as 80 per cent of the cane in large areas, according to Gov. Pinkham, who returned yesterday from a week's visit on the Valley Island.

CABLE \$7000 TO PAY SOLONS' WAY

Seven thousand dollars to pay the expenses of railroad transportation of the party of congressmen that are to visit Hawaii in November, will be forwarded from here by cable to Angus Ely, in charge of the plans at Washington. This was decided and passed in a resolution this morning by the committee named in charge of the appropriation of \$40,000 for this visit.

HOOPER RULES FOOD LAW WON'T HIT SAKE MAKING

The local Japanese sake brewers won the first round of their fight to import from Japan, and manufacture sake in Hawaii. Last month, through their legal adviser, Robert W. Breckons, they forwarded a resolution to National Food Commissioner Herbert E. Hoover in Washington, protesting against the prohibition by the national food commission of the importation from Japan, and manufacture of sake in Hawaii.

KERENSKY IS VICTOR IN BATTLE WITH CONVENTION

PETROGRAD, Russia, Oct. 9.—Through the iron will and resourcefulness of Premier Kerensky the provisional government has won a complete victory over the preliminary parliament. Executive Officer Tsereteli has informed the premier that the demand that the government be responsible to it has been withdrawn and an understanding has been reached that the parliament will act only in an advisory and legislative capacity.

LIBERTY LOAN COMMITTEE BULLETIN

Liberty Bonds
are exempt from all taxation except estate and inheritance taxes, unless you own more than \$5000 worth of them. If you do hold more than \$5000 worth, they shall be exempt from the normal income tax but not from the surtaxes, excess profits or war profits taxes. On this subject Liberty Loan Circular No. 6, issued by the U. S. Treasury Department, says:

BRITAIN ASKS SHIPPING HELP

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 9.—It was learned here today through official channels that Great Britain will ask the assistance of the United States in transporting supplies to Europe, and a conference will be held tomorrow between Sir Frederick Black, Britain's shipping representative in America, and members of the shipping control board, U. S. navy officials and oil producers in an effort to devise plans whereby the enormous amount of freight now awaiting shipment to the Allies can be handled.

RESERVE CORPS MEN TO IMPORTANT POSTS

Two reserve officers recently called to active service were assigned to important positions in separate military garrisons by post orders issued today. Captain M. E. Ginn was named as post quartermaster at Schofield Barracks, succeeding Captain Bayard Sneed, 32nd Infantry, who has been acting quartermaster. Captain John E. McNellis, U. S. R., was appointed coast defense adjutant of Oahu, relieving Captain W. W. Hicks. Orders issued today direct Captain Harry E. Murray
