- (e) That at three meals each week at least one dish shall be served prepared from food unconsumed at previous meals.

Tokio, Japan, Oct. 10.—One hundred and forty greedy merchants were gathered in by the police yesterday and fined 30 yen each for selling provisions and fuel to flood sufferers at high price. More are expected to be arrested today.
New cases of dysentery appeared today among the flood victims but so far no deaths are reported.
The rain has stopped in the city and vicinity of Tokio this morning but the rivers are still rising. There are still thousands of houses submerged along the streams in and around the Japanese capital.

NOVEMBER 16 IS ARBOR DAY DATE SET BY PINKHAM

Gov. Pinkham today designated Friday, November 16, as Arbor Day for Hawaii, issuing a proclamation in which all the schools of the territory and that the day be devoted to the planting of trees and shrubs. The proclamation follows:

The practice, now widespread on the mainland, of setting aside one day each year as Arbor Day, began in Hawaii 12 years ago. Since then, here as well as elsewhere, the larger movement for the conservation and development of all natural resources, of which Arbor Day represents only one phase, has made great progress. Eight years ago, in consequence of the quickening of the public conscience and interest in these matters and the practical results therefrom in the inauguration and extension of active work along these lines, the scope of the day was enlarged.

Accordingly, I hereby designate Friday, the 16th day of November, A. D. 1917, as Arbor and Conservation Day for the territory of Hawaii, and recommend that on that day appropriate exercises be held in all the schools of the territory and that a part of the day be devoted to the planting of trees and shrubs.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the territory of Hawaii, at the capitol, in Honolulu, this 10th day of October, A. D. 1917.


