## RED CROSS DRIVE CHRISTMAS WEEK IS CONTEMPLATED

A. L. Castle, president of the local Red Cross Chapter, has received notice from headquarters of the Pacific Division that another great drive for membership is contemplated for Christmas week, that busy time being chosen because it is at the Christmas season more than any other that all hearts are open toward human suffering.

Red Cross membership in the United States is already considerably over 4,000,000, but this, for all that, is only about 4 per cent of the actual population of the country. The goal set by Red Cross headquarters in Washington is 24 per cent of the entire population, or twenty million members of the American Red Cross by July of next year.

"Hawaii has not so far to go as some other parts of the country to reach this goal," said Mr. Castle this morning. Our last big drive, added to the membership we had before, gave us a membership that takes in 18 per cent of the entire population of Hawaii. That leaves us only 4 per cent more to get to make up our quota. We ought to be able to do that without great trouble."

More of the dollar members should be magazine members, Mr. Castle thinks, since only through the Red Cross magazine can members keep themselves informed as to the work that is being done by the Red Cross among the sick and suffering at the front. It is proposed at headquarters in Washington that future drives emphasize being laid on securing the two dollar memberships, which will include a year's subscription to the magazine.

"We shall not attempt another great drive here so soon," said Mr. Castle. "However, in keeping with the wishes of headquarters, and also, in keeping with the Christmas spirit, I think it is only right to have some place downtown open all the week before Christmas, and some one in charge to take voluntary subscriptions to the Red Cross. I have not decided upon any place as yet, but some suitable and convenient office will be selected, and the public duly informed as to its location."

## PHILIPPINE SUGAR SOLD IN GOTHAM

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—The market has remained quite dull and practically unchanged throughout the past week, with few transactions reported. Some 3,000 tons of Philippine Centrifugals and 7,000 tons of Philippine Muscovados, all now en route from San Francisco, which were sold at 6.90c basis 96 deg. and 5.75c basis 88 deg., comprised the only business reported in the New York markets. Refiners have been willing to pay 5-7/8c basis 96 deg. c. & f for prompt shipment Cubas, but apparently no sugars have been forthcoming on this basis, as the holders of the limited quantity left for sale in Cuba still show a disposition to hold off in the hope of securing higher prices. The United States food administration, however, will not permit business at any higher than 5-7/8c basis 96 deg. c. & f, (6.90c.)

An interesting development of the week was the announcement that the American S. R. Co. is negotiating for about 100,000 tons of new crop Louisiana sugars for November-December delivery at New Orleans, at 6.35c basis 96 deg., (it being understood that about half of this quantity will be shipped to North Hatteras ports, with the sellers allowing .25c to cover the freight.

The shortage of refined sugar in the Eastern territory has finally reached an acute stage, and has probably been accelerated by the prominence given to the subject in the public press, as the rather alarming reports published have induced householders to attempt to purchase a reserve supply. Many retailers have sold out their entire stocks of sugar, while others have been demanding exorbitant prices. The United States food administration, working in conjunction with local authorities, notified retailers that the price for granulated should not be higher than 10c per pound in New York City and 11c in the suburbs. The United States food administration also requested refiners to discontinue selling sugar to confectioners, gum, syrup and cordial manufacturers. Subsequently, however, realizing that this would throw a great number of people out of employment, the food administration modified this ruling and it now appears probable that these manufacturers will be permitted to buy about 50 per cent of their usual quantity of sugar.

## SUGAR CONDITIONS IN STATES ARE CHAOTIC, SAYS BREWER'S HEAD

"Sugar conditions in the states are chaotic," said E. F. Bishop, head of C. Brewer & Co., who arrived on the Matsonia yesterday morning, after a lengthy business trip to the coast. "Business is so unsettled that nothing definite can be said about it. The fate of our ships depends entirely upon the decision of the shipping board."

When asked if he could give any resume of commercial conditions in the states, Mr. Bishop declared that business generally was "up in the air," and it was impossible to pick out any particular data. The sugar market is in a state of uncertainty, as is nearly every other commodity, said the big sugar man.

## GENERAL WHO LED TROOPS ON VERDUN SUFFERS DISGRACE

AMSTERDAM, Holland — Lieut. Gen. Berthold von Deimling, former military commander at Zabern, Alsace, will be pensioned, according to the Berlin military Wochenblatt, which adds it is believed he will be made responsible for the failure of the German troops before Verdun, where, in 1916, he commanded the fifteen German army corps.

General Von Deimling was military commander at Zabern in 1913, when the historic outbreak between the populace and the military occurred. This trouble resulted from an attack with his sword by a German officer on a crippled shoemaker, which the populace resented and which led to violent fighting between the townspeople and the military.
