DOUGHBOYS HAND TROOPERS COAT OF WHITEWASH

SCHOOLFIELD BARRACKS, Nov. 11.—The 1st Infantry and 4th Cavalry eleven clashed in their first game of the Oahu football series, the doughboys administering a coat of white-wash by trouncing the troopers by the count of 21 to 0. The one feature of the game was the spectacular work of Boghan, who scored the three touchdowns and goals, totaling the 21 count. Boghan was there for all plays, his work in intercepting forward passes and blocking punts being responsible for three touchdowns. His unerring toe also completed the touchdowns by three goals.

The game was played under ideal conditions, a clear sky, with just enough breeze to temper the heat, great crowd and a fast, dry field. The conditions were greatly in contrast to the game played a week previous between the 32nd Infantry and "Y" teams, when the players wallowed in mud. However, the game a week since was the more cleaner so far as playing tactics was concerned, more or less dirty playing marking today's contest.

Dark Horses
The cavalrymen were entered as "dark horses" in the race, and while suffering a defeat today it would appear they are to make things hum for several of the teams of the league. They can attribute their defeat to play fumbling and also slowness in handling passes and punts. They played all around the infantrymen in the second and third quarters, while the doughboys had the best of it in the first and last period.

Boghan contributed his herculean work in the first, third and last quarters, when he negotiated the touchdowns by intercepting forward passes, blocking punts and picking up the ball on opponents' fumble, respectively.

Pemberton, Spooner, Greenaway, Boghan and Mutch played a spectacular game for the 1st Infantry, while Charbrait, Finley and Cronk did excellent work for the troopers.
