SELINSKY WILL APPEAR MONDAYS

Three recitals are to be given in Honolulu by Max Selinsky, the famous Russian violinist, who is now visiting the city. They will be given in Mission Memorial Hall on the next three Monday nights, Nov. 13, Nov. 26 and Dec. 3.

The list of society women who have consented to act as patronesses includes Mrs. L. Tenney Peck, Mrs. Rudolf Buchly, Mrs. Alexander Hawes, Mrs. Montague Cooke, Mrs. Robbins Anderson, Mrs. W. D. Westervelt, Mrs. W. A. Love, Mrs. Albert Judd, Mrs. Elizabeth Mackall and Mrs. Royal D. Mead. The season tickets for the three recitals will be placed at \$4, including the war tax. Single seats will be \$1.50, with the war tax additional, bringing them to \$1.65. Sections may be reserved for students at a lower rate. The tickets are at Bergstrom's music store.

Frank Moss will be the accompanist for all the recitals. The programs for each will be entirely different, and will be announced in advance. The Tschalkowsky concerto will be featured on one evening, and on one of the other dates Edwin Ideler will assist Selinsky in the Bach concerto for two violins.

Selinsky is on his way to the mainland from a tour of New Zealand, where he gave 43 concerts last winter and spring. His press notices are of the most enthusiastic sort and cover territory from Montreal to New Zealand. His New Zealand tour was an immense success, and it was during this time that he appeared in several concerts with Madame Nellie Melba.

He carries today a gold-lined silver cigarette case, with an inscription inside the cover saying that it was a gift to him from the 148th Overseas Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Forces. The presentation of the case was made on Feb. 14, 1916, by the mayor of Montreal, in recognition of the excellent work which Selinsky had done there in a series of concerts for the British Red Cross, at which over \$4000 was raised.

RUSSIAN BALLET WINS INTEREST

One of the rarest opportunities which has been afforded Honolulu is to be given next week, when for four nights the Russian ballet programs will be given at Lanika theater. Ivan Bankoff, the premier Russian dancer, and Miss Almee Manarde are the stars, and they are surrounded by a galaxy of local social stars who are lending their efforts to the performance.

Part of the proceeds are to be given to the Red Cross, which accounts for society's readiness to volunteer for the daily grind of rehearsals for the productions. Two complete programs will be given, involving an immense amount of instruction and rehearsal to make them ready in so short a time.

Rehearsals are being held daily in the Lanika theater under the personal direction of M. Bankoff, himself a star of the Russian school and graduate of the severest system of training in the world, that of the ballet school of Petrograd. Though a small man physically, he has a strength quite disproportionate to his size, as a result of that severe training for many years. He is able today to take a man weighing 180 pounds up from the floor and throw him a distance of six feet to the side, and yet his movements are instinct with grace and expression.

He is one of the few famous solo dancers of the Ballet Russe, the others being Mordkin and Nijinsky. He has appeared with the Russian ballet in the Metropolitan Opera House and is now on his way to Australia, where a tour has been arranged for him.

Miss Maynarde, who appears with him in Honolulu, is an Australian girl who is on her way home after triumphs in London. She is also a dancer of the first rank and has a dainty distinction all her own.

Among those who will take part in the Honolulu productions are Miss Florence Butler, who takes the part of the sultana in "Scherherazade," the chief feature of the program for the first two nights; Donald Blanding and Arthur Wyman. Mrs. Reynolds McGrew and Miss Isabel Baker, with a number of others, are to be members of the cast.

DR. DINWIDDIE WILL SPEAK TO MEN'S LEAGUE

Because of the delay in the arrival of the steamer Wilhelmina Fred B. Smith, the noted evangelist who is to conduct a campaign here beginning tomorrow, will be unable to attend the annual meeting of the Men's League of Central Union church this evening, at which he was to be the principal speaker.

Dr. E. C. Dinwiddie, chairman of the committee on legislation of the National Anti-Saloon League, has been secured to take Mr. Smith's place, and will deliver a practical address on the liquor situation.

The annual meeting will open at 6 o'clock with a "get-together" meeting and supper will be served in the parish house at 6:30 o'clock. This will be followed by the annual meeting, at which officers for the coming year will be elected and reports of the past year's work presented.
