Permits Required By All Travelers To Other Islands

Announcement issued by the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co., states that every person purchasing a ticket from Honolulu to any other port in the territory will be required to produce either a permit from the president and a traveling permit from the local U. S. attorney, or give evidence satisfactory to the company that he is not an alien enemy.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 1.—Word has reached Washington that the Scandinavian countries, Norway, Denmark and Sweden, are expected to refuse to agree to the war trade board's terms for controlling food exports.

PARIS, France, Dec. 1.—Violent attacks were made today by the Germans on the Verdun front. Combining intense gun fire with great masses of infantry, the Germans attempted again and again to break the French lines but the French held every foot of their trenches and the Germans were repulsed with heavy losses.

Two Petition Out Asking Congress to Make Hawaii 'Dry'
