REAL ENMITY IN JOAN FILM

Due to popular demand, the Bijou management has decided to hold over the wonderful film "Joan the Woman" another two days to give opportunity to many who have not seen it, a chance to do so tonight and tomorrow night. Since this film began its run ten days ago the Bijou has played not only to capacity houses but to audiences which have waxed enthusiastic in their praise of the production, pronouncing it a masterpiece, the equal of which has never been seen here.

An example of the painstaking care given to perfection of detail in this drama appears in the wonderful "Battle of the Towers," a monster hand to hand struggle of the Middle Ages in which 3000 persons are combatants. ALASKAN FILM AT THE HAWAII

LOU TELLEGEN AT THE LIBERTY
