There will be seven races, with more entries and the consensus of opinion appears to be that the New Year's races will more than make up for the Christmas events. There appears to be only one person who does not delight in holding their hands out to hear the jingle in athletic events, whether they be good or bad, but the public not interested in any horse or any event other than for the sport of it wants to know.

An Improvement

A well known horseman in the city who has entered horses in the past was talking to a group of horsemen yesterday. All were interested in racing. He was asked his candid opinion about the New Year's events. "I must say that the Christmas card did not come up to expectations, but I believe that the New Year's races will be satisfactory to everyone." That was the opinion of the man who is interested in horses, and would like to see the meeting a real success.

To begin with the mile race should be a real one from start to finish. Maty Jay sprang a surprise in the last race and with Umpqua and Florence Roberts also entered in this event, the racing followers should have some good racing. Johnny Carroll took Florence Roberts the seven furlongs in 1:35 on Saturday and the Macfarlane entry looked good for the distance.

Florence Favorite

Florence Roberts should be the favorite in the mile event, as the Macfarlane entry has been known to go the distance in fast time, and furthermore showed enough in the Christmas race to guarantee some real racing in the event tomorrow. Florence did not have any trouble with her bowed tendon and if all goes well should pass the wire first.

Of interest to racing fans is the fact that the card tomorrow will show a baby race, Mrs. Walter Macfarlane has entered Suanie and Remark in this race. The two year olds were brought here from the Wingfield stables, and when notified that there were no other entries Mrs. Macfarlane decided to enter them in one race. Two entries in a race doesn't attract as a rule, but it should in this case as the racing fans will have a chance to see what the baby runners can do.

Harness Race

The harness race will bring out Welcome Boy and Zorena. Little is known of Zorena, but in the workouts the Suanie entry has made good time, and will be picked by many to win over Welcome Boy. In the second race of the day Lahontan Water appears to have the call, although the other entries are good over the four furlongs.

The mule race will bring out a lot of class, and the gentlemen riders are certain to show something. The race for patrolmen brought out a lot of comedy in the last race and should prove to be as interesting this time.

Fifth race—Four furlongs for mounted patrolmen. To ride in full uniform. Owners not obliged to ride. Purse of \$75, of which \$25 goes to second. Mr. Espinda's "Self," Mr. Kamaia's "Oyster Lip," Mr. M. Lopez, Halifax; Mr. Kaukani, Black Harry; Mr. H. Kibachi, Swede Sam.

Sixth race—One mile, free for all. Weight for age. Purse \$350, of which \$50 goes to second. Florence Roberts, Maty Jay and Umpqua.

Seventh race—Half mile, free for all. Gentlemen jockeys. Weights 160 pounds. Cup to owner; sport pin to jockey. Lahontan Water, Golden Spray and Rosella.

The Asahis started out to win and gathered two runs in the second and five runs in the fourth. Nine hits in the first four innings gave them a big lead. The Japanese tied it up in the fifth when they put over six runs. Although the Asahis scored double the number of hits in the next few innings they fell one run short of victory.

Hit Would Have Won

Three men were on bases for the Asahis in the last inning with two men when Zenimura came to bat. A hit would have won the game, but the little short stop hit a hard one to left which was captured by Ueno and the game was over.

Kozuki was the man who left the gate open all day, and had it not been for his misplays the Asahis would have captured the game with at least a run to the good. Yoshikawa played a beautiful game both behind the bat in the field, and with Miyahara landed the batting honors for the day, getting three hits each.
