## KAHULUI WAKES UP.

### Railroad Manager Sets the Ball a' Rolling--

An Enjoyable time.

At the invitation of Superintendent Miller, the employees of the Kahului Railroad Company and friends gathered at his residence on Thursday evening with a view to the marking of another milestone in the life of their popular chief.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller exerted themselves toward the perfect enjoyment of their guests, and their efforts, coupled with the absence of any formality in the arrangements, brought forth the unanimous opinion that the gathering was one of the most successful and pleasant in the history of Kahului.

After dinner, partaken of by a few close friends of the hosts, the party adjourned to the spacious lanai, and passed the time in pleasant conversation until 8 o'clock, when their number was considerably increased by the arrival of other guests, followed by an excellent quintette composed of employees of the company—this latter a little surprise on their chief by the "boys."

Dancing to the music of the quintette club, was commenced at 8:30 and continued with short intermissions filled in with vocal and instrumental music and elocutionary effort contributed by individual guests, until quite half past one, when the strains of "Hawaii Pono" signalled the termination of a most pleasant evening.

### Kahului Notes.

Three steamers before breakfast in one morning, constitutes a record arrival list for this port, and things began to hustle somewhat lively at the unwonted sight.

The Naualani brought new rolling stock for the K. R. R. The Lehua was loaded with the household goods of Mr. David Center the new assistant manager of H. C. & S. Co.

And the Claudine came in with a heavy load of freight and passengers, swollen somewhat by the presence of the of the Republican Convention delegates.

The new manner of setting the passengers and their baggage ashore all at once on a lighter is a great success, and a vast improvement over the old plan of rowing them over in oat-load instalments. Before the passengers are well seated on the lighter, a second one is being loaded with freight, and the change has very much accelerated the dispatch which can be given to the Claudine, as well as being a boon to the passengers who disembark here.

Mr. David Center will occupy the new house in the center of the plantation which was lately vacated by Mr. Walter Lowrie, who moves in to headquarters to take over the superintendence of the manufacturing department for the coming campaign. The late superintendent Mr. Henning is about to return to his old employ at the Pioneer mill at Lahaina.

Quite a number of the Japanese laborers from Spreckelsville came back from their investigating tours during this past week, and, as they found conditions much the same everywhere, they concluded to once more locate themselves on the old stamping ground.

## POLITICS

### Republican Platform.

The Republican party of the Territory of Hawaii in convention assembled hereby make the following declaration of principles, to the support of which we and our candidates are pledged:

We heartily endorse the platform of the National Republican party and the nominations thereupon of William McKinley for President and Theodore Roosevelt for Vice President of the United States.

We believe in the equality of all men under just laws of their own making and we shall oppose any restriction or limitation of the suffrage which we now enjoy under the Territorial Acts.

We shall, as speedily as possible, endeavor to secure Statehood for this Territory.

We demand more speedy improvement of our harbors, wharfrage and landing facilities throughout this Territory to meet the requirements of rapidly increasing commerce, and

we shall strive to secure from the National Government appropriations for the improvement of our harbors, the erection of public buildings and for other public needs.

We recognize the importance to this Territory and to the country of the construction of the Nicaragua canal under governmental ownership and control, and pledge our party's earnest and continued efforts to secure the early commencement and completion of the work, and we urge upon the United States Congress the prompt enactment of such legislation as shall secure the construction of the Pacific cable.

We favor the employment on all public works of only qualified voters and citizens of the Territory. We believe that eight hours should constitute a legal day's work for all laborers, mechanics and other persons employed on public works.

We recommend continued liberal appropriation for the maintenance and comfort of our unfortunate fellow citizens at Kalaupapa, Molokai, in order that their segregation may be as small a misfortune as possible.

We declare ourselves in favor of the extension of the homestead principle and the prompt enactment by Congress of such law as will provide for the early settlement and improvement of our public lands under the supervision of the local authorities, and with the least difficulty and expense to the settler.

We favor the establishment of county and municipal governments as soon as practicable.

We oppose all trusts and monopolies and all combinations tending to control supplies and prices.

We advocate that a liberal allowance be appropriated by the Legislature for the use and benefit of Liliuokalani.

We earnestly request the Congress of the United States to amend that portion of the Territorial Act which provides that the English language only shall be used in legislative proceedings so as to permit the use of the Hawaiian language.

We favor the payment of all just claims for losses caused by the action of the Board of Health in suppressing bubonic plague, and in this connection we urge that the Congress of the United States should provide the means for such payment out of the customs receipts collected at the ports of this Territory.

We recognize the necessity of reforming our system of taxation, and to this end favor careful consideration of the whole subject with a view to adjusting the public burden so that it shall be least felt by the poor.

Relying upon the wisdom and support of the voters of the Territory of Hawaii and the guidance of divine providence, we shall earnestly strive to carry out the foregoing declarations and to do what ever else may be necessary to perpetuate upon our soil a "government of the people, by the people and for the people."

### TEACHER'S HEALTH CERTIFICATES.

The Department of Public Instruction has adopted a rule that all teachers in its employ must, at the commencement of their service and on or before the first of August in each year thereafter, present to the Department a certificate from some regularly licensed practitioner, stating that they are free from tuberculosis or other communicable disease and that they are physically able to discharge the duties of teachers.

Blank forms for certificates will be prepared and forwarded to the School Agents, who will furnish them to teachers as may be needed.

Health certificates as provided for above are to be forwarded to the Secretary of the Department before the beginning of the coming term.
