First:- All of that certain piece, parcel or lot of land, at Pulehukili, containing an area of 8.83 Acres, located as aforesaid in Kula, Island of Maui, Territory of Hawaii, and being the same premises described in Royal Patent No. 1217, and being the same premises conveyed to George Forsyth deceased, by deed of Kahiki Helehuia, dated June 22nd, 1898, recorded in Liber 183, on pages 150 and 151 of the Register of Conveyances.
Second:- That certain piece, parcel or lot of land at Omoapio, Kula, Island of Maui, Territory of Hawaii, containing an area of 30 Acres, being the same premises described in deed from Samuel Kalli to George Forsyth deceased, dated the day of June, 1898, and appearing of record in Liber 183, on pages 149 and 150 of the Register of Conveyances.

Third:- That certain piece, parcel or lot of land situated at Omoapio aforesaid, containing 2.50 Acres and being the same premises described in deed from Halekiala Ranch Co. to George Forsyth deceased, dated May the 17th, 1902.
Fourth:- All the undivided one-half interest of the Estate of said deceased in and to that certain lot, piece or parcel of land, with the buildings thereon, situated near the Leahu School, in the town of Lahaina, Island of Maui, Territory of Hawaii, containing an area of about 8000 square feet, and at present being under lease to and occupied by one Watanabe.

The city water committee made an examination of the inlet up Iao and recommended that 2800 feet of the 3 inch pipe be taken out and an 8 or 10 inch pipe at the least a 6 inch pipe be substituted. The proposed extension will cost \$3500.00. They were granted until the following meeting to report still further.
The appropriation committee had no written report ready but stated that they were negotiating to have old appropriations renewed.

The Public Hall Committee reported progress and asked for further time which was granted under the head of new business the old complaint of estrays damaging to lawns and hedges was voiced and a resolution instructing the road board to communicate with Sheriff Baldwin asking appointment of police officers who should have the full authority to take such action in picking up and impounding animals and other measures as would lead to immediate and permanent obedience.

S. B. Harry as inspector of the new jail and fire station, urged that the association take such steps as would obtain an additional appropriation over and above the special appropriation of 5000.00 to complete properly to above building, grade the yard, erect a suitable fence, lay a concrete side walk and furnish a fire bell, which was not included in the building estimate. After considerable discussion the matter was referred to the Executive Committee. Adjournment was taken to await the report of this committee going into session.
The Executive Committee will recommend \$3000.00 for grading the yard, \$3000.00 for proper side walks on Wailuku's main street and the extending of the fire tower to permit the placing of a fire bell also recommended.
