I believe that the Kahului oil is not so rich in asphaltum constituents nor as heavy as is desirable for the best results on roads. But I still believe that it can be used in some places, particularly as a binding for top dressing of a macadamized surface, with advantage and economy.

I have examined the steel bridge crossing Iao stream and find that it needs thorough scraping and chipping to free it from rust and then repainting. This will be done as soon as proper paints can be secured. It will cost in the neighborhood of \$100 and possibly more. Two sites for the crushing plant for the road between camp 2 and camp 3 have been picked out and rock is being broken and collected and hauled to one of these sites on the railroad by courtesy of the H. C. & S. Co. The crushing plant will be ready in about two weeks and active work on macadamizing begin. With the amount authorized, viz., \$5000.00, at the last meeting of the board, the road can be macadamized from Camp 3 to a point somewhat beyond Camp 2. The rotary screen belonging to Wailuku has been overhauled and assembled ready for work and plans made for an economical crushing plant with bins, chutes etc. In accordance with the instructions of your honorable body I have interviewed the committee of the Wailuku Improvement Association in reference to the sidewalk proposition on Market and Main Streets. I have to report that committee has succeeded in obtaining a written agreement from all the property owners or lessees along the streets in question, to defray one half the cost of constructing said cement sidewalk and curbing in front of their respective holdings. This agreement with a letter from the chairman of the said committee is herewith presented and I desire to recommend the adoption of the proposal of the said committee by this honorable body, suggesting that the work be done by contract. Before this can be done however, it will be necessary to establish lines and grades of these streets and decide upon a disposition of the ditch under the sidewalk along Market Street. I have searched in vain for any information showing official lines of these streets and have come to the conclusion that there are no official lines existing except the right of way for a highway acquired by the Territory and now in the hands of the county. The County certainly can claim as a highway every portion of these streets used for 5 years by the public for highway purposes including sidewalks. The proper course, it seems to me, is to adopt a line as near as possible to the line of fence and buildings, with a reasonable attempt at straightening and removing unsightly jogs, but it would entail unwarranted expense to attempt to make these streets perfectly straight from end to end. A system of give and take can be used along Main Street which will improve the line without expense. The curb line of Market Street can be established leaving a 40 foot roadway and the sidewalk made to conform to this without moving any building.

I recommend a width of 5 feet for Main Street and of 6 feet for Market Street, leaving an approximately equal distance on either side of the walk, between the curb and the fence, to be filled in with earth.

LAHAINA DISTRICT.

The largest item of expense in the Lahaina District for this month has been the repairing of retaining walls on the new Honokohao road which has cost \$343.20. This work has been done in a thorough manner, however, and it is hoped and believed that there will be little further expense

of this kind for it is likely that the effect of time will tend to solidify that portion which has not already fallen down.

The feed and tool rooms authorized by the Board have been built adjoining the stables and all given a coat of whitewash.

The balance of work in this district has been repair work, spreading of soil on road below mill and soil and stones on Mill Street, filling in holes along the main road, etc.

Plans have been made for a bridge at Kahana and work begun there. This bridge will cost about \$225.00 and will do away with a very troublesome crossing of the stream. A relocation of the belt road from Honolulu to Napili has been picked out and a portion staked for grading and work begun. This work will cost about \$3000 and will reduce grades from twenty and twenty five per cent to 5 per cent making a continuous good road from Lahaina to Honokohao.

The Honokowai bridge has been inspected and plans made for a new structure with a center pier, doing away with the trusses. Material has been ordered for this bridge and work of erection will commence as soon as the Kahana bridge shall have been finished.

I recommend that a concrete bridge be built across the stream at Ukumehame as seen as the Honokowai bridge be completed. Plans have been made for this bridge which is to be similar in character of the concrete bridge at Kauaia, Puuhea and Waikapa, but with a larger span.

Steps have been taken to begin macadamizing the main roads of Lahaina, rocks are being collected for the crusher, the site has been chosen and a rotary screen has been ordered and plans made for the bins and chutes. The steam roller which is to be brought from Hana is being put in condition and will be shipped to Lahaina in about a week.

Two tents have been ordered for the Lahaina District and will be delivered in a few days for use in the outlying districts.

A wagon suitable for hauling macadam and harness for same have been ordered from the coast.

Accompanying this report are the reports of the four overseers on Maui and diaries made out by them from day to day showing their personal movements.

The board authorized the macadamizing of the Paia Makawao road beginning at the Paia depot and work will begin at once.


The County engineer was instructed to make a survey of the road petitioned for Pauwela to Haichaku. He was further instructed to advertise for bids for hauling the material and fencing fifteen thousand feet of fence along the Huolo Peahi road.

The most important act of the board so far as the residents of Wailuku is concerned was the acceptance of the plan of the Wailuku Improvement Association to have a concrete sidewalk from Hight Street down Main to Market and thence down the Mauka side of Market Street. The holders of adjoining lands offer to pay one half of the cost of the same while the County will pay the other. This is a satisfactory arrangement to all concerned.

The County engineer was instructed to begin macadamizing the road from Moalii bridge through Lahaina to Olowalu. The construction of the Honokowai bridge was authorized.

The paper was ordered for the ballots for next election.

The County Attorney was authorized to wire and write the High Sheriff and ask him to delay the removal to Honolulu of long term prisoners as they are badly needed on the public roads.
