"Were there not saloon keepers who could not obtain a license, because some voters made kicks, being paid to do so?"

"Were there not contractors prevented from bidding on public construction or to work on them, because they were not citizens?"

"Were there not Buddhists who desired a charter for religious worship, and had it refused by a narrow minded and bigoted officer, who took it upon himself to think it was a patriotic organization more than a religious one, in this free country where the people are allowed free speech, free press, and free worship?"

"Is there not a bill being devised now, among the white liquor dealers and hypocrites, who desire to plunder the right to sell booze from the Nipponese to be introduced in the coming Legislature?"

"If we keep on like this, there will be no end, and soon everything will pertain to the white race only, and it may some day restrict all the industries in the Territory to American citizens only."

"Then what will our interests in Hawaii be? What benefit will Nippon have in sending her people here to assist in the welfare of the island territory? It is just as well to shut up the country to the Nipponese if they are afraid to allow this friendly nation to have a little chance for making."

"More oppression and more insults, when it reaches the utmost point there will be a collision between the two races, and it may lead to a disturbance of the peace of both nations."

Now comes the threat of war and ruin:

"We believe that it is very important for our government to follow the example of Great Britain and United States of America, to DISPATCH HER WAR VESSELS TO THE FOREIGN PORTS WHERE MOST OF HER SUBJECTS RESIDE, and protect any rights and interests which they already have by conditions of treaty. Especially to the countries like Hawaii where the white people treat the Nipponese with insolence, and where this is getting worse every day, the government should keep a war vessel here continually; so it may attract the attention of these IGNORANT, DISCOURTEOUS AND IMPOLITE PEOPLE OF HAWAII."

"If we ever have such a misfortune as to have difficulties with Uncle Sam, the Hawaiian Territory will be sure the fuse that causes it. To compare our interest and friendly relation with Hawaii to those of the mainland is not necessary. We would rather lose Hawaii than lose anything from the mainland or cause ill-feeling with our good neighbor."

"The world is still large enough. Besides Hawaii there is much more room for the superfluous population of Nippon. If our government should stop the passports into Hawaii under penalty of a severe punishment, for a year there would be no more Nipponese on the islands in a short time, and no more bothering those falsely patriotic people of Hawaii who are so fearful that the Nipponese might take their country from them as they did from the kanaka."

"We ask our government to keep a war vessel here constantly in order to evade all disturbances. If not, then we wish the government to decide at once to grant no more passports for Hawaii in order to keep our race from the islands where we can not insure our rights, and guarantee our interests. We can not afford to lose the friendship of the father of our civilization on account of Hawaii."

"We know that the Hawaiian will never love us, they keep us here because they can not get any other race. As soon as they find any suitable settlers for Hawaii, they will drive us out. It is about time to pack our trunks and get ready to desert the islands to escape future misunderstanding with our best friend, Uncle Sam."--Advertiser.

A. G. M. Robertson remarked that on the last occasion of the kind the Republican leaders held an informal conference in the office of the Governor in regard to the platform.

After the meeting one of the executive committee remarked that it did not follow that there would be any conference in the Governor's office this year, although the Governor's views might be given the opportunity of expression.

It was suggested by the Chair that it seemed that a liquor plank ought to go into the platform.

"Do you mean that we should favor amendments to the liquor law?" was asked.

"Yes, I do. There seems to be kicks on the present liquor law from everybody, from the prohibitionists to the rum-sellers themselves."

"Then we should not forget the education platform and the raising of the teachers' salaries," said the Chair.

Everybody agreed that the teachers needed more money.

The executive committee met to consider kicks from the Seventh and Eleventh precincts of the Fifth District in regard to alleged non-residents holding office in the clubs, but deferred the matter until tomorrow noon.

The executive committee handed down its decision on the protest in the Eleventh Precinct of the Fifth District this afternoon. The decision holds that the Board of Registration was at fault and recommends that the error be corrected by the Precinct Clubs on their re organization. - Bulletin, Aug. 7.

Japanese Paper Wants Warship Sent to Hawaii.

The Hawaiian-Japanese Daily Chronicle is excited over the treatment of Japanese in Hawaii and wants a warship sent here. It says that members of its "honorable race are treated in a most disagreeable and unpleasant manner; receiving all kinds of insolence and contempt the same as the lowest class of people like the inferior Dagoes and the greedy Jews."

Isn't this ground for another race meeting at the Orpheum? The Chronicle then adds:

"Was there not a man burnt to death by pouring oil over his body and setting fire thereto?"

"Was there not school children objected to in the public school on account of race?"

"Were no physicians refused a license to practice medicine in the Territory, because they could not speak English?"
