



## Telegraphic News.

HONOLULU, March 1.—Tourists are held here again owing to lack of accommodations. The Korea and Wilhelmina were booked full a week in advance.

Plumage seized from the Thetis was turned over to the agricultural department.

Penal summons was issued for forty-two owners and drivers of autos for exceeding the speed limit.

Captain Jacobs the commander of the Thetis is to be transferred to the command of the practice ship Itasea.

A. W. Thompson will make a fight in the Alden Bessie case. The North German Lloyd may make Honolulu a port of call. The steamship Asia is due from San Francisco tomorrow.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—The Pacific Mail may have trouble. The government objects to the Panama policy, and Dickenson will invoke the anti-trust law against the steamship monopoly.

MINNEAPOLIS, March 1.—The railway engineers and firemen may go on strike. They have voted to go on strike unless the railway grants their demands.

CHICAGO, March 1.—W. A. Broadwell, a wealthy manufacturer of oleomargarine has been sentenced to six years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$15,000 for selling imitation butter.

HONOLULU, February 28.—The material for the construction of the Pearl harbor drydock arrived yesterday.

Major Dunning inspected the Honolulu companies of the National Guard yesterday. The companies presented a good appearance in spite of some few misfits in uniforms.

The public wants to know in what grave the building ordinance has been buried.

An auto accident on Alakea street resulted in a minor accident and a smashed bicycle.

WASHINGTON, February 28.—Representative Tawney of Minnesota made a bitter attack on the naval programme of the administration. He denounced the talk of war with Japan as a conspiracy to stampede the county into a period of naval extravagance.

ROME, February 28.—The royal geographical society voted to present medals of honor to Peary, Castleton and Count de Abruzzi.

PHILADELPHIA, February 28.—The city faces a general strike. 125,000 working men are ready to join the street car strikers on Saturday.

HONOLULU, February 16. Work has been stopped at Pearl Harbor. It is a temporarily shut down to await plans for a greater dock.

The Tenyo Maru arrived with her gang ways smashed and a portion of her rail carried away during a tempest.

There are only two days left in which to file federal tax returns. Many are slow.

The methodist church is reported as robbed last night. It is the third case of the kind in a week reported to the police. Arrests are expected.

NEW YORK, February 26.—Indictments have been returned against many meat packers for conspiring to keep up prices by limiting the supply.

PHILADELPHIA, February 26.—John Murphy the president of the Central Labor Union of this city has been arrested for inciting riots.

WASHINGTON, February 26.—Congressman Kitchen goes after the tariff. He declares that the rich are benefitted while increased cost of living is being paid by the poor.

PHILADELPHIA, February 26.—Shaw denies he is a prophet of evil and that he predicted war with Japan.

WASHINGTON, February 26.—Ensigns Austin and Rogers have been detailed to act as additional attaches at the American Legation at Tokio.
