

Kahului Notes.

At the recent monthly meeting of the Young Men's Club, the following officers were elected for the next six months: President, Edmund I. Kellet; Vice-President, Reginald J. Melanphy; Secretary and Treasurer, Ahuna Waikoloa; Members of the Board of Managers, the above-mentioned officers, with Messrs. John Makahio, Henry Long, Rev. H. P. Judd and C. R. Willard. The retiring president, Mr. R. S. Gray, spoke of the work that had been done during the last six months and reported several improvements that are being appreciated by the members. Early in July the work of transforming the gymnasium into a theater will be begun. Mr. H. B. 
