THIS CONGRESSMAN WANTS BIG NAVY.

WASHINGTON, November 10.—Representative Roberts of Massachusetts, predicts increased naval building for United States as lesson of European war.

MEXICAN MESS GETTING WORSE.

WASHINGTON, November 10.—Situation in Mexico assuming seriousness that worries government officials here considerably. American marines landed at Acapulco yesterday and place occupied. Were landed at urgent request of residents. Rioting at Vera Cruz and looting in City of Mexico reported.

National bank sacked by mob led by Constitutionalist soldiers. Other disorders reported, though Carranza has issued ultimatum and proposes to act as head of republic until Gutierrez assumes presidency and appoints cabinet. WASHINGTON, November 10.—Three Turkish cabinet ministers, representing peace party, have resigned.

HONOLULU, November 10.—Robt. W. Shingle returned by Matsonia from coast, says strong G. O. P. sentiment in States. Federal building bill slated for early action, he says.

SAME CONTRADICTIONARY STORIES.

LONDON, November 11.—Reports of Russian reverses at hands of East Prussians come by wireless from Berlin and Vienna; while Petrograd reports German and Austrian defeat by Russians.

CLAIMS GERMANS ASKED FOR PEACE.

Advices to London Post from Rome say: "Germans alarmed at Russian successes. Made offers of peace which were rejected."

From Amsterdam come dispatches confirming Germans are transferring cavalry and artillery from western to eastern frontier. Russian lack of artillery has been compensated everywhere by preponderance of infantry. Freezing and hardening of roads has accelerated movements of Russians. Germans have abandoned hope and are returning to Poland, as shown by destruction of bridges on their retreat, and damage to roads wherever possible. Interest of Germany now centering in operations on eastern frontier.

Beginning operations not actually announced. Further report of victory by Germans before Wierballen announced.

SAY TURKEY WOULD LIKE TO QUIT.

From Berlin comes reports of religious threats from hierarchy of Mohammedan religion against those Mohammedans now fighting under British flag, against powers of whom Turkey is active ally. Turkey depressed over damage already inflicted by Russians. Ottoman empire is repenting rash adventure and may soon stop fighting.

RUSSIAN REPORTS SANGUINE.

Dispatch from Petrograd sanguine. German army attempting Polish invasion by way Nieman river, is stubbornly resisting Russian advance from prepared positions before Lyck. Yesterday three positions were taken by Russians and Germans were forced back towards Mazouria Lake.

FOG LIFTS AND FIGHTING RESUMED.

LONDON, November 11.—Official from Paris says: "Fog which has hampered operations near sea coast, is abating and Germans are attempting to pierce Allied lines by frontal attack south of Dixemude. Particularly violent encounter took place early in day between Armentieres and sea. Both sides alternatively on defensive. German attack south of Ypres repulsed."

EMDEN DID MUCH DAMAGE.

LONDON, November 11.—The Emden had destroyed British ships valued at \$4,000,000.

TALTAL, Chili, November 11.—Four German warships sighted from here steaming up coast.

EMDEN LOST HEAVILY BEFORE CAPTURE.

LONDON, November 11.—Capt. von Muller and Prince Francis Joseph, officers of Emden, taken prisoners by Sydney. Neither wounded. Emden lost 200 killed and 30 wounded. Two funnels of Emden shattered by Sydney's cannonade. In flames first hour after battle.

ANOTHER GERMAN WARSHIP ROUNDED UP.

LONDON, November 11.—Heavy German cruiser Koenigsberg is bottled up Mafia Island, near Zanzibar. British blocked harbor entrance.

RUSSIANS SOON TO STORM CRACOW.

PETROGRAD, November 11.—Russian Cossacks are raiding within 20 miles of Austrian stronghold, Cracow. Advance of Russians is serious. Commander of Cracow has ordered civilians to leave city immediately. Przemyśl, Austrian fortress, occupied by Russians, was later given up, now reinvested fully.

BERLIN CLAIMS TURKISH SUCCESSES.

BERLIN, November 11.—Official from Turkey says Russians driven to second line of defenses in Caucasus. On other side Turks have taken El Arish, near Egypt boundary and Palestine, important water supply port.

SERVIA CRUMPLING BEFORE AUSTRILIANS.

VIENNA, November 11.—Severe fighting between Austrian and Serbian forces taking place at foot of Mountain Shabaz. Austrians advanced in several districts. Captured prisoners and guns.

DESTROYED WHILE AT DANGEROUS JOB.

TOKIO, November 11.—Torpedo boat No. 33, sunk while dragging mines in Kiauchau Bay. Majority of sailors rescued.

CARRANZA WANTS AMERICAN TROOPS TO GO.

WASHINGTON, November 11.—Severe fighting is taking place in suburbs of City of Mexico. Zapata forces are attacking eight miles south of capital. Carranza accedes to demand by United States regarding evacuation of Vera Cruz by American forces occupying that city. This refers to guarantees demanded by United States that those Mexicans who afforded assistance to army of occupation be not molested on that account. Carranza's action is believed to be based on a desire to have American troops leave country as soon as possible in order that there may be no outside interference in his campaign against Villa.

FREE SUGAR SURE, SAYS SHINGLE.

HONOLULU, November 11.—Shingle says free sugar is certainty.

BRITISH CRAFT SUNK BY GERMANS.

LONDON, November 12.—British torpedo boat Niger torpedoed by German submarines and foundered in the Downs. All of crew rescued.

SMALL CRAFT ONLY AT TSINGTAU.

VANCOUVER, November 12.—At Tsingtau Germans lost one unprotected

cruiser, five gunboats and a mine layer. The largest German ship found sunk in harbor is the unprotected cruiser Cormoran, sister of Geler.

GERMANS WIN FROM ALLIES.

LONDON, November 12.—Desperate fighting and heavy losses on both sides. Germans forced way through French line near Dixemude Tuesday, and occupied town. This gives Germans position on east bank Yser, passage of which may be next attempted. Battle here shows that statements of Germans sending troops east, were incorrect.

Battle in Belgium now raging with increased fury. While admitting reverses, French war office says position of Allies remains unbroken.

GERMAN REPORT OF VICTORY.

BERLIN, November 12.—"Good progress made yesterday. Stormed Dixemude, capturing 500 men, nine machine and driven enemy from Steoloi, despite British counter attack. We continue to hold dominating heights north Armentieres."

LONDON, November 12.—Military experts declare war will end next spring. A few continue to believe war will be a long one.

King George opened parliament yesterday. Experts are astonished at Russian advance in Poland—fourteen miles daily for eighteen days. Przemyśl has been invested by Russians for second time.

Rebels are given till 21st inst. to surrender in South Africa.

PROHIBITION AND BOXING.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 12.—Prohibition becomes law in state of Washington, January 1st, 1916.

Local fight promoter will contest boxing at Olympic, on 12th.

EVACUATION OF MEXICO BEING CONSIDERED.

WASHINGTON, November 12.—Wilson and Bryan had three-hour conference yesterday to determine question of evacuation of Vera Cruz by American forces.

THOMAS WON'T TAKE SECOND PLACE.

PHILADELPHIA, November 12.—American relief steamer Belgian sailed today with 1900 tons food for Belgian sufferers.

THINK GERMANS DETERMINED TO REACH COAST.

LONDON, November 12.—German capture of Dixemude was accomplished at cost of terrific losses. Calais is only fifty miles away. Dunkirk nearer. Germany's determined capture of Dixemude confirms belief that German purpose is to cleave way to French coast at any cost unless defeated before goal is reached.

FIGHTING BUT NO RESULTS.

PETROGRAD, November 12.—Along battle line in Belgium and France there are alternate advancements and retirements without important results.

AUSTRIAN TROOPS WIPED OUT.

NISH, November 12.—Number of Austrian infantry battalions with quick-fire guns, which crossed Danube near Szedervo, on Monday, annihilated by Servians in counter attack. All survivors captured, numbering 2000.

SAY GERMANS ARE DIRECTING TURKS.

PETROGRAD, November 12.—General staff Russian army in Caucasus says Turkish soldiers taken captive report German officers directed attempt to envelope Russians. Vienna admits armies withdrawn from Galicia. Also that investment of Przemyśl is complete.

BERLIN SAYS TURKS HAVE WON.

BERLIN, November 12.—Turkish official reports says Russian completely defeated after two days fighting. Frontier Turks now occupy Russian position.

GOEBEN BADLY DAMAGED.

PETROGRAD, November 12.—Dispatch from Constantinople says Allies in recent bombardment of Dardanelles, struck Turco-German cruiser Goeben, shell piercing water line. Damage serious.

TURKS LOSE TORPEDO BOAT.

LONDON, November 12.—Turkish torpedo boat has been captured off Tenedos, in Aegean Sea.

MORE RELIEF SUPPLIES TO GO SOON.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 13.—Steamer Camino will take supplies from here to Belgium sufferers; having been chartered by relief committees.

MURDERED BY TRAINED NURSE.

SAN ANTONIO, November 13.—A trained nurse murdered Otto Koehler, a brewer of this place. Says in self defense. Afterwards attempted suicide. Is under arrest.
