

HONOLULU, December 1.—Nolle pros in Bert Bower case today in U. S. District Court.

DETAILS OF INDECISIVE ACTIVITY.
LONDON, December 2.—Petrograd says Germans are on defensive only in one place on left bank Vistula.
German soldiers captured are in pitiable condition. Hands and feet wrapped in peasants' shawls and frozen in many instances.
Vienna claims Russian defeat at Homonna greater than at first believed. Passes in Carpathians are in hands of Muscovites.
Construction of air and sea craft by Germans is being rushed in supreme effort to reach England.
Considerable activity in Belgium yesterday. Violent fighting renewed along Yser. Germans showing activity north of Arras.

PROBABLY MEANS REINSTATEMENT.
BERLIN, December 2.—von Moltke has recovered health.

MILITARY EXTENSION FOR KOREA.
TOKIO, December 2.—This government plans military extension in Korea during next year.

MEXICO'S NEXT PUPPET ELEVATED TODAY.
MEXICO CITY, December 2.—Gutierrez, provisional president, formally enters palace tomorrow and will be formally installed. Villa and Zapata are in city at head of strong force. Rumors that Zapata is opposed to Gutierrez's installation.

GERMANS ADMIT CHECK BUT CLAIM MUCH.
BERLIN, December 2.—Official. On west in France and Belgium Allies made insignificant gains, which have now been checked. Kaiser's own regiment captured strong position from French in forest Argonne.
Battle in east Prussia taking normal course. Allies attack in North Poland failed. In southern Poland, between November 11 and December 1, in battles around Kutno, Lodz and Lowicz, Germans captured 80,000 unrounded Russians.

VIENNA, December 2.—Austrians have occupied Belgrade.

PARIS SAYS ALL IS GOING WELL.
PARIS, December 2.—Official. South of Ypres, enemy failed to capture entrenchments previously lost. Our artillery damaged three important German batteries. We occupied Vermelles and surrounding park. Important point. We captured several trenches and in artillery duel destroyed a German battery in region of Vindresse and Caronne.

AUSTRIAN MONARCH NEAR END.
LONDON, December 2.—Reported Emperor Francis Josef in feeble health and likely to die any moment.

MUST BE NO FILIBUSTER FROM TEXAS.
WASHINGTON, December 2.—After news received that 700 Mexicans recruited in Texas had crossed the Rio Grande to join the Mexican army, orders were issued to shoot if necessary to prevent armed filibuster from crossing border.
Rear-Admiral Mahone is dead.

SAUERKRAUT AROUSES SUSPICION.
SAN FRANCISCO, December 2.—Steamer Olson N. Mahony, with cargo of sauerkraut and provisions is held up as suspicious. Investigation to be made. Purchasers are shielded. Matter will be taken into court.

TREATY WITH AUSTRIA RENEWED.
WASHINGTON, December 2.—General arbitration treaty between United States and Austria has been renewed.

GLOOMY FORECAST BY McCLELLAN.
PRINCETON, December 2.—George B. McClellan says trouble for America will follow war. Disarmament of nations will not follow and United States may get into trouble with winning nations.

SEVERE WEATHER IN ALASKA.
NOME, December 2.—Behring Sea ice pack has been forced back by furious blizzard raging here during past three days and all lowlands are flooded.

KUHIO GETS AWAY AT LAST.
HONOLULU, December 2.—Kuhio left for Washington today.

ALLIES MASSING FOR AGGRESSIVE ACTION.
LONDON, December 3.—Changes are taking place in Flanders. British and French are strongly reinforced. British command Yser region. Believed first British troops dispatched to France have reached front. Allies are in sufficient force and will take offensive in the west.
Germans reported to have evacuated several positions near Yser. Artillery duels in Belgium last night. Berlin concedes gains on West but Kaiser's regiment captured strong point from French supports in region of Argonne.

SAY DE WET IS CAPTURED.
Official reports from Pretoria says De Wet is captured.
Son of Belgian Premier is reported killed in battle.

POLAND BATTLE STILL IN DOUBT.
Reports from both sides agree that they have suffered in great battle in Poland, which is still undecided.

ITALY'S POLICY SOON TO BE DECIDED.
ROME, December 3.—Assembling of parliament today anxiously waited. Premiers will decide policy of Italy regarding war.

VILLA'S ARRIVAL RESTORED QUIET.
MEXICO CITY, December 3.—Arrival of Villa's troops followed a reign of terror which had lasted a week. Presence Villa's troops tended to restore order. Sixty men killed. When Blanco forces retired, mob ran riot. Gutierrez will be installed as president.

BRYAN HAS PLAN TO SUBMIT.
WASHINGTON, December 3.—State Department will propose creation of a natural zone.

SAYS PEACE IS REMOTE.
WASHINGTON, December 3.—Ambassador White informs President that settlement of war is remote.

GOVERNOR ISN'T READY FOR PUBLICITY.
HONOLULU, December 3.—Governor Pinkham has written an opinion on Rapid Transit extension franchise. Refuses to give to press.

LITTLE FIGHTING NOW IN BELGIUM.
LONDON, December 1.—Little progress reported from Belgium last night. Germans remained on defensive, with Allies securing positions taken past few days. Artillery fire of Germans reported feeble. British military observer says that since the enemy abandoned attacks in force, fighting has become a sniping competition and a series of small affairs contested with rifles and grenades, bombs, mortars and mines. Excellence of commissariat largely responsible British successes. Probably no other so good during active campaign.

HEAVY BURDEN IMPOSED ON BRUSSELS.
AMSTERDAM, December 1.—German governor of province Brabant, called financiers of Brussels together and demanded \$7,000,000 monthly to support German troops. Also imposed additional penalty \$75,000,000 for violation of neutrality from which Germany has suffered.

NOBLE PRIZES TO BELGIAN SUFFERERS.
COPENHAGEN, December 1.—Scandinavian papers are advocating that money of Noble prizes this year go to Belgian refugees.
