Ferreira Loses First Point For Reinstatement

A writ of mandamus to compel the county auditor to issue a salary warrant to John Ferreira, as deputy sheriff, was denied this morning by Judge Edging, after argument of the case by Lorrin Andrews and Eugene Murphy, for the petitioner, and County Attorney Bevins, for the auditor. The court held that the sheriff's notification to the auditor that Ferreira was no longer a deputy was sufficient authority on which to refuse to issue the warrant. The point will probably be appealed.

Should the supreme court sustain Judge Edging, it is understood that further action will be taken to compel the re-instatement of Ferreira.

ORDINANCE No. 36 AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE EXHIBITION OF MOVING PICTURES OF AN EDUCATIONAL OR BIBLICAL CHARACTER ON SUNDAYS, AND PROVIDING RESTRICTIONS THEREON AND PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION HEREOF.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Maui:

Section 1. Any person paying the requisite license fee, as provided under Section 2077 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii for 1915, as amended by Act 225 of the Session Laws of 1915, for conducting a moving picture show on Sundays and who shall desire to exhibit to the public in the County of Maui, between the hours of 6:30 P. M. and 9:30 o'clock P. M., on Sunday, any moving picture film or films of an educational or biblical character, may make application to the Treasurer of the County of Maui for a license or permit to exhibit such film or films in the manner hereinafter provided.

Said application shall be in writing, shall set forth the name and address of the applicant for the permit, the occupation or business of the applicant, the location and character of the building in which said film or films are to be shown, and the day or days and hour proposed for their exhibition.

The said application shall be accompanied by an affidavit sworn to by the applicant or some person having knowledge of the facts on behalf of said applicant, showing to the satisfaction of the Treasurer of the County of Maui that the film or films proposed to be exhibited are either educational or biblical and are in no sense vulgar, indecent, suggestive or improper pictures to be exhibited.

On filing of an application and affidavit, as required in this ordinance, the Treasurer of the County of Maui shall issue a permit to the applicant for the exhibition of said pictures between the hours of 6:30 P. M. and 9:30 o'clock P. M. for the Sunday or Sundays designated in said application, and the Sunday or Sundays upon which said film or films are to be exhibited shall be set forth in said permit.

Section 2. Any applicant who shall misrepresent in said application or in said affidavit the character of the film or films to be shown, or who shall exhibit the same, or any part thereof, at any time other than that specified in the permit, shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 together with costs of Court, and upon failure of said person so convicted to pay any fine so imposed, the said person may be committed to jail until said fine and costs shall have been discharged by operation of the Laws of the Territory of Hawaii applicable thereto.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its approval.

Sunday Movies To Be Shown In Maui Theaters

The Sunday movies bill is now a law. The supervisors passed finally upon the ordinance at last Saturday's meeting, and as a result the movie fans will be able to take in a show on Maui next Sunday night for the first time. The Wailuku Orpheum and Valley Isle managements took out a permit today, and it is understood that the Pioneer Theater at Lahaina will also give its first Sunday show at the same time. For the time being at least, Wailuku and Lahaina will be the only places in the county to take advantage of the new law. Under the ordinance the shows may not begin earlier than 6:30 p. m., nor continue later than 9:30 p. m., and the managers of the show houses must make affidavit in each instance that the pictures to be shown are either educational or biblical, and not vulgar. They may be fined \$100 and imprisoned for violation of the ordinance.

ORDINANCE No. 35 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE AND MAINTENANCE OF BUILDINGS AND PORTIONS OF BUILDINGS AS GARAGES AND STANDS FOR AUTOMOBILES, THE COUNTY OF MAUI, TERRITORY OF HAWAII.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Maui:

Section 1. No building, part of building, or room of any building shall be used or maintained as a garage or stand for automobiles within fifty (50) feet of any part of that portion of Market Street lying between Mill Street and Main Street in the town of Wailuku; or within One Hundred (100) feet of any part of that portion of Main Street lying between Dunn Street and Mill Street in the town of Lahaina, in the County of Maui, Territory of Hawaii, unless such building, part of building, or room of such building so used or maintained as such garage or stand for automobiles shall have a fireproof floor and the wall have a surface of fireproof material to a height of not less than six (6) feet above the floor, or unless there shall be a clear space of not less than twenty linear feet between the building, part of building, or room of such building so used and maintained as a garage or stand for automobiles and any adjacent non-fireproof building or structure; and no person, firm or corporation shall use or maintain any building, part of building, or room of any building as a garage or stand for automobiles contrary to the provisions hereof.

The word fireproof floor as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean a floor composed of dirt, sand, gravel or stone or cement or concrete of a thickness of not less than 1 inch and the word fireproof material as applied to walls shall be taken to mean corrugated iron, zinc, concrete or other material equally as effective.

Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof, shall be liable to a fine of not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars together with costs of court; and in the event of default in the payment of such fine or costs, any such person shall be imprisoned until such fine and costs shall have been discharged by operation of the general law of the Territory of Hawaii applicable thereto; and every day during which such violation shall constitute distinct violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. This ordinance shall become effective upon the 1st day of July, 1916, and after posting of a true copy hereof upon a bulletin board in front of or near the room occupied by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Maui and upon the publishing of a true copy hereof in one issue of The Maui News and the Weekly Times, newspapers of general circulation published at Wailuku, the County Seat of the County of Maui.
