On the Other Islands

The Kaula chamber of commerce, after investigating the non-appointment of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Brown as principal and teacher in the Waimea school, has adopted a resolution asking that the two teachers be appointed again. The Kaula commercial body says that the reasons of the school department are trivial and not substantiated. It is understood that a spirit of insubordination is given as the cause of the failure to re-appoint the two teachers, but Superintendent Kinney has thus far not made public the reasons which he gave the Kaula committee.

SUGAR ESTIMATES REDUCED
Most of the sugar plantations on windward Hawaii have just announced revised estimates of this year's crop, showing a decided drop in previous estimates. Oloa has reduced the estimate from 26,300 tons to 22,000. Brewer & Company estimates Pepee-crope crop will be 20 percent less than 1915; Hakalan's, 14 percent; Hilo's 16 percent; Onomea's 25; and Honomu's, 27 percent. The announcement was followed by a general slump in the stocks of these plantations. Oloa dropped sharply from 23 1/8 to 19 1/2, and will possibly sell still lower.

NO HYPHEN FOR PREACHER LAUGHTON

INTERESTING ART EXHIBITION

A large number of Maui people have been much interested during the past week in the beautiful exhibit of paintings by E. W. Christmas, R. B. A. 1912, now on view at the Maui Hotel. Mr. Christmas came to Maui several months ago, and during that time he has made quite a number of studies of various scenic points about the island. He seems to have grasped the peculiarities of coloring and atmosphere of the Islands with unusual fidelity. A number of the paintings are of scenes in the South American Andes mountains, his "El Cristo del Frontera" being one of the most striking of this type.

CONTRACTS LET FOR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

For the purpose of opening tenders for the construction of several school buildings, the board of supervisors met yesterday afternoon, R. A. Drummond of Hana, and Dr. Raymond being absent.

Paul F. Lada was awarded the contract for the 2-room school to be built at Paia, at his bid of \$2975, time 45 days. T. Burlem was the only other bidder for this job, his tender being \$3012.

For the 3-room school building at Puunene, Charles Savage was the successful competitor at \$2153, time 45 days. T. Burlem bid on this \$2862.

For the 2 bed-room teachers' cottage at Paia, Paul F. Lada bid \$2185 and got the job. T. Burlem bid \$2231.
