END OF WATERFRONT RESTRICTIONS TOMORROW

WASHINGTON, December 24—Instructions will be sent tomorrow to all waterfronts and other areas restricted by presidential order, that they will be opened for free use of all citizens.

This means the removal of the guards in Honolulu, who will be paid off and discharged tomorrow.

GUARDSMEN TO BECOME CIVILIANS

WASHINGTON, December 24—The war department has ruled that officers and enlisted men of the national guard are to revert to a civilian status when discharged from the federal service. The decision practically wipes out the guard as it existed before the war.

KUHIO'S COLD KEEPS HIM HOME AGAIN

HONOLULU, December 23—Kuhio is knocked out again with a cold but his condition has improved and he hopes to reach Washington in January.

MPHÉE GETS KAHOOLAWE LEASE

HONOLULU, December 23—Angus McPhee has leased the island of Kahoolawe for 21 years. Appraisals are to be made every 7 years. The first 7 years annual rental is \$600.

SAYS JAPANESE ARE UNDEMOCRATIC

HONOLULU, December 23—Judge Mathewmann is back from Russia and the Orient where he spent 7 months doing Red Cross work. He gives the opinion that the Japanese nation as a whole is not in sympathy with the democratic ideas for which the western world has been fighting.

WOULD GIVE HIS FORTUNE TO GERMANY

HONOLULU, December 23—The late H. Wilhelm Wolters made his will 4 months after the United States entered the war, leaving his estate, which is valued at \$455,000, to the free German city of Bremen after 10 years in trust, during which time certain annuities shall be paid relatives. Practically all of his money is to go to Bremen for charitable, educational, scientific and other purposes. He named as trustees Jose Caetano, C. C. von Hamm, J. L. Cockburn, and J. L. Fleming of Honolulu. Herman Wolters, of Kauai is given 1 cent. He will present the case to Washington and it is believed the government may seize and dispose of the estate otherwise.

Wolters was an American citizen when he willed the fortune he made in Hawaii to the German city.

WOULD GIVE FIGHTERS BONUS

WASHINGTON, December 23—The senate has adopted the revenue bill amendment giving a bonus of a month's pay to all officers and men of the army, navy, and marine corps honorably discharged after November 11.

SITUATION IN ESTHONIA SERIOUS

WASHINGTON, December 23—The state department is advised that a Bolshevik army of 10,000 is on the Narva front. The Esthonian situation is serious on account of the lack of arms.

VERSAILLES AS INTER-NATIONAL CAPITOL

PARIS, December 23—The foreign affairs committee of the chamber of deputies is considering a bill to make Versailles the capital of the proposed league of nations.

WILSON OPPOSES SINKING WAR SHIPS

WASHINGTON, December 23—It is stated authoritatively that President Wilson opposed in most direct fashion the proposal to sink the German warships surrendered at the armistice.

MRS. MARY DUNCAN COOK DEAD

HONOLULU, December 23—Mrs. Mary Duncan Cook, widely known in the Islands died on Sunday. She was born in Honolulu in 1839. She was the widow of Thos. Cook, one of the founders of the Hana plantation, Maui. She leaves 8 children, including Thomas Cook, of Hilo, and H. E. Cook, of Puunene, Maui. The funeral will be held on Tuesday morning.

NEW YORK, December 23—The Peary Club has announced that next June Capt. Robt. Bartlett will lead an expedition to survey the north pole by airplane. Peary conceived this plan for the purpose of establishing the existence of new lands.

YANKEE AIRMEN MADE GOOD

WASHINGTON, December 23—American airmen during the war, downed 854 German planes and 82 balloons, against a loss of 271 planes and 45 balloons. Casualties were—109 killed; 103 wounded; 290 missing; 27 prisoners; 3 interned.

HUN GUN BUSINESS BUM

BERLIN, December 21—The Krupp company passed its annual dividends. It paid 12 percent for each of the first 2 years of the war, and 10 percent last year.

GERMAN STRIPPED POLAND

WARSAW, December 21—Germans stripped Poland of materials, and machinery. On the last day of November 11, a few thousand Polish legionaries disarmed more than 20,000 German soldiers who planned, revolt against their officers. The Germans removed all food phone wires. It will cost \$2,000,000,000 to repair the damage.

WOULD HAVE U. S. HANDLE LEPROSY

HONOLULU, December 21—The Hawaiian medical association by committee, appeared today before the leprosy investigation committee and proposed that all leprosy matters be placed under federal control. It urged that the coming legislature revise the defective in the laws regarding leprosy.

DEMobilizing FAST NOW

WASHINGTON, December 20—Secretary Baker has announced that over 300,000 soldiers have been discharged from the army and returned to civil status. The rate of demobilization has reached 150,000 weekly.

BURLESON WOULD LET GO OF CABLES

NEW YORK, December 20—Newcomb Carleton, president of the Western Union Telegraph Co., and federal director of the merged cables, after a conference with Postmaster General Burleson, said the latter does not intend to hold the combined cable systems as a government monopoly after the declaration of peace.

George M. Cohan in "Hit-the-Trail Holiday"

The newest vehicle of George M. Cohan, the eminent actor-manager, dramatic author and composer, is "Hit-the-Trail Holiday," a picturization of his famous play which ran for a season in New York in 1915-1916, and which subsequently was produced all over the country with enormous success. The various scenes of the picture were photographed under the direction of Marshall Nellan, the finishing scenes having been taken in Long Island, and among the various incidents shown are included a scene in the New York Subway.

As Billy Holliday, Mr. Cohan gives an excellent imitation of Billy Sunday, the famous Evangelist, and becoming converted through his love for the daughter of the prohibition leader, he engages single-handed in a desperate battle with the German brewery interests in an inland New York town and through his eloquence and magnetism succeeds in making the town go dry, and obliges the brewery employees to desert their employment and identify themselves with the "near beer" enterprise in which Holliday is interested.

One of the most interesting scenes is that showing a prohibition meeting when rough brewery employees who seek to break it up, are dispersed by Holliday, who explodes a large stock of fire-works, which had been provided to celebrate the downfall of booze. A score of skyrockets are used as a sort of barrage against the mob, with highly diverting effects. The Germans are given a hard swat in dealing with the brewery interests engaged in Teutonic propaganda. The picture is strictly up to date.—Advt.


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
