

Congress Committee Hears Of Haleakala

Plans Made For Advertising Island Attractions By Government—Dr. Mather And B. G. Rivenburgh Tell Congressmen About Hawaii

That Secretary Lane and Director of National Parks Dr. Stephen T. Mather, of the same department, are doing all that they can for Hawaii in an effort to develop our national park, is evidenced by the following taken from a report of the meeting of the House committee on territories on a hearing on Hawaii's park held on February 19. Dr. Mather, who has never been to Hawaii, but who hopes to be able to visit here soon, showed a very good knowledge of the situation here, which he must have gained through considerable study. Among other things he said:

Hawaii Parks To Be Featured
Secretary Lane, before the Committee on the Public Lands, speaking in regard to the creation of the Roosevelt National Park in California, said that we have a great circle of parks on the mainland, and if we had this additional park in Hawaii it would be a wonderful side trip for tourists to take. While we are trying to develop our own scenic areas in this country, let us have it in shape as soon as we can, so that we can be able to put the scenery we have to offer in our show windows under the best conditions possible.

You may be interested to know, gentlemen, at last, after a year's work, the Railroad Administration is going to get out a series of booklets on the parks of the country, and that is going to be done in a large way, and among others they are going to get out a book on the Hawaiian National Parks. With that done we ought to be ready as soon as possible to really take proper care of these newly created parks and to administer them as we do other parks in this country.

Haleakala Available
After the difficulties of acquiring title from the Bishop Estate for the lands needed for the Kilaua park, the matter of Haleakala came up. B. G. Rivenburgh, late land commissioner of Hawaii, who happened to be in Washington at the time, and who was present, was called upon. The following is from the record:

The Chairman (Hon. Wm. C. Houston). That tract on the island of Maui has not been acquired, as I understand it?
Mr. Rivenburgh. No, the private interests in that tract have not been acquired, but we have assurance that the large owners within the Haleakala area, the Baldwin interests, will very gladly turn over whatever may be necessary to the Government for park purposes if they are assured by Mr. Mather, or whoever is in charge, that the goats breeding within the crater are killed off or kept down the same as predatory animals, and not allowed to get over the rim of the crater and destroy the crops.

The Chairman. In reference to the Baldwins, I want to say that any representations that Frank or Harry A. Baldwin make will be carried out in perfectly good faith.
Mr. Rivenburgh. The reason Mr. Mather, representing the National Park Service, should go to the islands is to know exactly what we want. In reference to the Haleakala section, I feel that when Mr. Mather reaches Haleakala and goes over the ground he will see that it will not be necessary to acquire title to that immense crater, some 7 miles across and 20 miles around, if we can acquire, as the bill provides, permanent rights of way for trails and roads and sites for any buildings. I think you went through this, Mr. Chairman.

The Chairman. Yes.
Mr. Rivenburgh. The most feasible way to go through the crater is through the Kaupo Gap. If you acquire title to a trail taking that in, and perhaps some side trips, it will be sufficient. I did not feel that, representing Mr. Mather's office in the Islands, I could do much with the Haleakala proposition until somebody was there who could settle the question as to whether or not they wanted all of that area, or a portion of it, and with the assurance Mr. Baldwin gave me I thought that was sufficient to close it one way or the other when we saw fit. The active crater is the Kilaua Crater, and that is where we need action, and that is what this bill was primarily drawn to accomplish.

Mr. Hamlin. I move, Mr. Chairman, that the bill be amended by inserting after the words "authorized" in line four, the words "subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior."
(The motion was carried.)
Mr. Hamlin. I also move that the bill be amended by inserting after the word "otherwise" in the same line the words "except by purchase."
(The motion was carried.)
Mr. Hamlin. I move the chairman be instructed to report the bill to the House.
(The motion was carried.)
(Thereupon the committee adjourned.)

KINNEY'S SCHEDULE APPROVED

HONOLULU, March 12—The Senate ways and means committee has approved Superintendent Kinney's schedule of teachers' salary increase, to cost about \$700,000 more for the coming 2-year period than heretofore.

JAPANESE PROTEST AGAINST SCHOOL LEGISLATION

HONOLULU, March 11—Representative Andrews' bill to regulate foreign language schools was introduced this afternoon in the House.

Two thousand Japanese at a mass meeting last night adopted a resolution to be presented to Governor McCarthy, saying that the Japanese schools are conducted in accordance with true spirit and the principles of the United States government, and hoping that there will be no legislation against these schools. The meeting also adopted a resolution to send to the Japanese delegates in Paris, asking that an effort be made to insert in the peace treaty a section abolishing racial discrimination for the sake of humanity and justice.

BILL FOR PLEBISCITE ON SUFFRAGE

HONOLULU, March 11—Representative Jarrett introduced a bill today providing for a plebiscite on woman's suffrage. He said the electorate should pass on this important question. The bill passed its first reading in the House.

BIG FIGHT EXPECTED FOR LIHUE CONTROL

HONOLULU, March 11—R. H. Trent, representative of Custodian Palmer, has been instructed to sell the Lihue Plantation alien owned stock as a whole at a sale to be held probably on April 2. The Cookes need 2000 shares of this stock for a control of the company, but now must buy all of the 9000 shares to gain control. It is expected American Factors will bid, and that the stock will probably bring nearly \$2,000,000.

BIG OIL FIRE CAUSES \$200,000 LOSS

HONOLULU, March 7—A cargo of gasoline and kerosene, taken from the bark Harvard, which arrived here several months ago enroute for Manila in a leaking condition, and was stored on Sand Island, caught fire just before noon today. The loss is \$200,000. Firemen kept the flames from communicating to the territorial powder magazines containing half a ton of dynamite. The temporary warehouse built to hold the oil cargo burned. It is still blazing sky-high tonight, and thousands of spectators line the waterfront watching the big blaze. The blaze started when a gasoline torch used by men in soldering cans exploded igniting rubbish, and spread to the warehouse.

WOULD ROE MAUI TO BRIBE KAUI

HONOLULU, March 7—After a heated debate the reapportionment bill was again defeated in the house by a vote of 17 to 13. Further consideration is deferred until March 21. Speaker Holstein moved an amendment to cut Maui's delegation from 5 to 4 and to increase Kauai's to 4 instead of 3. It is believed that the measure when reconsidered might have a chance, with this amendment, of winning Kauai's support.

So far as he knew Robbins never saw the President.
