Maurice Tourneur's latest picture, "The White Heather," tells a strong story worked out to a striking climax in a submarine fight between the hero and the villain on the ocean's floor.

OAHU POLICE INDICTED AS MEMBERS OF GAMBLING HUI

HONOLULU, Dec. 18—The circuit court grand jury has returned some more sensational indictments in connection with its probing of gambling in this county.

Today indictments were returned against Deputy Sheriff Joseph Luahwa, of Laie; Police Captain J. H. Holi, of Hauula; Officer Solomon III, of Punaluu; Officer S. W. Logan, of Laie; and an automobile rent service driver named Tai Ton, of Punaluu. All are charged with conspiracy in connection with alleged organized gambling which it is claimed has been going on at Punaluu for a long time past.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OPPOSES PROGRAM OF WASHINGTON COMMISSION

HONOLULU, Dec. 18—The chamber of commerce opposes in part the program of the special legislative committee, which is leaving for Washington shortly for the purpose of endeavoring to get various changes made in the organic act.

The proposed increase of the territory's debt limit from 7 to 10 percent of the assessed valuation is one of the items taken exception to.

Another is a proposal to increase the salaries of legislators; and still another is Wise's "back-to-the-land" plan for Hawaiians, by which the territory would acquire former public lands which shall be given to Hawaiians on perpetual leases.

The chamber approves certain land law legislation, however.

Governor McCarthy has received a cable from Washington authorizing the commission to sail before January 1, and it will probably leave accordingly by the transport Logan, due to sail on December 27.

JAPANESE FORM NO DECISION ON STRIKE—WILL PARADE INSTEAD

HONOLULU, Dec. 18—Japanese labor leaders stated today that no decision had been arrived at in the matter of the proposed strike of plantation workers. Plans are being made both here and in Hilo for holding big labor demonstration parades instead.

PARIS, Dec. 6—Following the concessions granted by the supreme council in the matter of reparations to be charged Germany on account of the sinking of the German warships at Scapa Flow, experts today discussed the mode of reparation now to be followed.

SUGAR BILL PROBABLY TIED UP TILL AFTER CHRISTMAS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17—The sugar control bill met a temporary setback today when the senate refused to sidetrack the railroad legislation on which it is engaged in order to consider it. The expectation of its advocates that it would be rushed to a conference committee and enacted before Christmas recess is now considered hopeless.

Senator Harrison urged the senate to confer on the house amendments without sending it to a committee, but Senator Ransdell objected because he opposes the licensing provisions added by the house.
