A real service has been rendered not only to screen fans, but to every American who has laughed over the work of immortal Mark Twain by the screen version of "Huckleberry Finn."

The very spirit of the narrative and its gifted author lives upon the screen. To the director, William D. Taylor, who has done similar good work in "Tom Sawyer" and "Huck and Tom," goes the credit for one of the most enjoyable plays of the year.

The film takes up the story where Huck and Tom are made rich by the discovery of the treasure in the cave. Follows the kidnapping of Huck by his rascally father, his adventures on the raft on the river, his meeting with the "King" and the "Duke" and with the slave Jim, and subsequent return to the village where he had been mourned as dead.

The old story of the country maiden who longing for the bright lights, journeys to a New York hall bedroom with light ambitions and a wicker suitcase, is tempted without success, and then returns, disillusioned to the little rural village is given a brand new and uproariously funny twist—several of them, in fact—by vivacious Dorothy Gish in her latest screen farce, "Mary Ellen Comes to Town."

Miss Gish is chauffeur of a small town soda fountain at the start of the

picture. Later in the city she becomes a cabaret singer and is used by her boss as the lure to attract a certain young man's pocketbook. But she upsets the dope by falling in love with her victim.

"The Lost Princess," the new comedy vehicle for the William Fox stars Albert Ray and Elinor Fair, tells the love story of two newspaper people, and much of the action takes place in newspaperdom. A complete newspaper office was set up for the screening, under the direction of two newspaper men. Everybody there from the managing editor to the copy boy, and the offices were fitted and decorated like the "real thing."

The clever young comedian Ray plays the part of a young man who breaks away from the farm to plunge into the newspaper world. Instead of finding fame he finds fortune in the heart of a clever newspaper woman who helps him to make good in a big story—which is really the story of her own life—the story of a lost princess who has fled to America from revolutionary Rurvania under an assumed name.

## McPhee Big Winner In Monday's Meet

Big Fourth of July Races Most Satisfactory In History of Track—Crowd Large—No Delays And No Accidents Mar Day.

Between 4000 and 5000 people, the largest crowd that has yet attended a race meeting at Kahului under the auspices of the Maui County Fair & Racing Association, saw a splendid program presented last Monday, and a first class base ball game immediately following. It was from all standpoints the most satisfactory affair of the kind that has yet been held on Maui. The receipts amounted to about \$3600.

Not the least satisfactory part of the performance was the fact that the 15 races were started promptly on time and were finished in 2 hours and 50 minutes. This is believed to be a record for good handling in the territory.

**McPhee Day**  
 It was Angus, McPhee's lucky day. In fact he was in the money of every race in which he had a horse entered and that was about 6 out of the 15. His Mary J. was the star performer of the occasion, taking first money in a 1/2 mile free for all, and later the 300 purse for winning the 1 mile free for all.

Mrs. McPhee's 3-year old, Bondero, won the pony 4-furlong race; and Angus' bay gelding, Young Boy took 2nd money in the 3/4 mile for Hawaiian bred horses, being beaten in this by Dr. Fitzgerald's Copra. He also had a joint interest with Frank Cameron in Gold Bryan, the game little 3-year old bay mare which led the field in the other big race of the day, the 1-mile Hawaiian bred free for all, with its \$400 purse.

Dr. Fitzgerald's old standby Copra, also won the 3/4 mile free for all, in 1:05 1-5.

## No Sign Yet Of Fern Weevil On This Island

While on Maui last Friday and Saturday, E. M. Ehrhorn, chief plant inspector of the board of agriculture and forestry, in company with Local Inspector Will J. Cooper, spent some time in looking for evidences of the fern weevil infestation which recently caused considerable alarm at 29-miles island of Hawaii, where the insect has been causing serious depredations in the forest ferns. The insect is also known on Oahu.

Mr. Ehrhorn visited the beautiful fernery of Mrs. A. N. Kepoikal and that of H. B. Penhallow, besides a number of other fern collections in Wailuku, and also examined the wild fern growth in Iao valley. It seems quite evident from this examination that the weevil has not yet gained a foothold in the Wailuku district, and very possibly in no place on Maui. A

special effort will therefore be made to prevent its introduction. It is at the present time unlawful to bring any kind of ferns from other islands to Maui, and also to bring any kind of plants in soil. A fine up to \$500 may be imposed for the violation of the board's rule in the regard, and a careful watch is kept to see that the rule is not violated.

The fern weevil is a small black insect about the size of the ordinary grain weevil, but more round. Its larva attacks the roots of ferns and bores up into the stems of the plants causing new fronds to wilt or die suddenly without apparent cause.
